GOVT. SEED-CLEANING DEMONSTRATION TRAIN

Of Ontario to Visit Points in the County of Haldimand—Will Stop at Jarvis

One day stops will be made at the C. N. R. Station at the following points in Haldimand County:

- Fri., Feb. 18—Cayuga
- Sat., Feb. 19—JARVIS
- Mon., Feb. 21—Hagersville
- Tues., Feb. 22—Caledonia
- Wed., Feb. 23—Dunnville

The object of the Seed Train is to demonstrate the proper method of cleaning grain, grass and clover seed, and to interest farmers in better seed grain. Fifty bushels of wheat, oats or rye and ten bushels of small grain will be required each day for demonstration purposes. Any farmer who will bring seed to the train for cleaning purposes should write to the Agricultural Office, Cayuga, stating the kind of seed, amount, and the point to which he will bring it for cleaning.

The train will consist of three cars, one of which will contain power and hand seed cleaning machinery. The second car will contain exhibition material, demonstrating the benefits to be derived from the proper cleaning of seed grain. The third coach will be a lecture car in which lectures will be given by special speakers at 2.30 p.m. each afternoon.

Seed cleaning will be demonstrated each day from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Farmers who bring in their grains and seed to the cars for cleaning purposes will, of course, TAKE HOME their cleaned grain and the screenings.

FIRST SESSION OF COUNTY COUNCIL—SECOND DAY

Cayuga, January 26, 1927. All the members present. The Warden in the chair.

Sherk-Shoup—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair. Colter-Sherk—That the report of the Public School Inspector be printed with the minutes in full and that the County papers when published it be paid \$5.00. Carried.

Colter-Melick—That we do now adjourn until 2.30 to allow the different committees to meet. Carried. Saunders-Wingfield—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair. Carried.

French-Jepson—That a by-law be introduced and read a first time authorizing the County of Haldimand to borrow from the Canadian Bank of Commerce the sum of \$100,000 required to meet the now current expenditure and authorizing a promissory note to be given, sealed with the corporation seal and signed on behalf of the Corporation by the Warden and Treasurer payable on the 31st December, 1927 with interest at the rate of 6% per annum. Carried.

Scott-French—That the by-law authorizing the loan of \$100,000 from the Canadian Bank of Commerce for the now current expenditure be read a second time. Carried.
