**Hunting In Canada**

“There is better hunting today in the Canadian Rockies than was the case when white men first began systematic exploration of them nearly fifty years ago,” said Tom E. It proved a wholesale devastation. Cries of alarm were soon heard from the farmers, and the U. S. Government bug police were quick to respond. Experts were sent to the corn-growing regions of Italy and France, to find and gather insect foes of the borer.

Two of these, newly arrived, are ruthless fellows. They are tiny wasps which look upon the corn borer as their most particular prey. It is their habit to lay their eggs upon the bodies of the corn-boring caterpillars, and the maggots hatched from the eggs feed upon the

Wherever the corn borers are the most numerous, there will be the parasite insects multiply fastest, because there is an unlimited supply of the natural food for their young. It is hoped that before long they will become sufficiently numerous to eat up nearly all of the borers, reducing the numbers of the latter so far that this new enemy of the corn will perhaps no longer rank as a major pest.
