## OBITUARIES

### MRS. ALVEN MARR

The heartfelt sympathy of the entire community was called forth on Saturday, January 8th, when it was known that Mrs. Alven Marr had passed away during the early hours of the morning. Following as it did the other recent sad bereavements, it cast a gloom over the whole village, for the late Mrs. Marr was universally beloved by everyone. Her kindly smile, cheerful disposition, and pleasant manner made her a general favorite with all classes in the village.

The funeral was held on Tuesday, January 11th. Following a private service at the house, for the relatives, the body was taken to Knox Church, where a large congregation had assembled to pay their last respects. Rev. W. T. Brown, who was the deceased's minister, conducted the service, during which he paid a heartfelt tribute to her memory. After the service the remains were conveyed to Port Dover cemetery, where they were interred in the family burying ground.

The late Mrs. Marr (nee Abbie McBride) was born in Marburg, March 1877, and was in her 50th year. She was the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James MacBride. From birth she resided in Marburg, and following the death of her father, she tended for many years; her age, mother, only relinquishing her task on the latter's death. In May, 1919, she married her husband, who survives her. She leaves five brothers and four sisters: Samuel and John A. of Port Dover; George and Sidney of Marburg; and Robert of Hagersville; Mrs. Long and Mrs. Perry, of Port Dover; Mrs. Cooper, of Smithville, and Mrs. John MacCarter, who at present resides in Jarvis.

Messrs. W. J. Bailey, S. R. Leatherdale, J. D. Deller, A. Inson, D. C. Allen and Willis Houston acted as pallbearers.

The late Mrs. Marr was a woman of splendid character. Thrifty, industrious and capable, she added to these characteristics, a cheerful heart and pleasant smile. To meet her was to have one's outlook brightened, and to hear her word of cheery greeting was like having a ray of sunshine shine upon one. In all her illness, she was patient, resigned, and contented. Passing, she leaves the memory of a kind heart, which is better than riches, and a loving disposition, which transforms life and makes it beautiful.

Mrs. Mary Sharpe, widow of the late James Sharpe, passed away at her residence, 153 Gladstone Avenue, Hamilton, on New Year's morning, in her 83rd year.
