## GOVERNMENT SEED CLEANING DEMONSTRATION TRAIN

of Ontario to Visit Points in the County of Haldimand—Will Stop at Jarvis

One day stops will be made at the C. N. R. Station at the following points in Haldimand County:

- Fri., Feb. 18—Cayuga
- Sat., Feb. 19—JARVIS
- Mon., Feb. 21—Hagersville
- Tues., Feb. 22—Caledonia
- Wed., Feb. 23—Dunnville

The object of the Seed Train is to demonstrate the proper method of cleaning grain, grass and clover seed, and to interest farmers in better seed grain. Fifty bushels of wheat, oats, barley and ten bushels of small seeds will be required each day for demonstration purposes. Any farmer who will bring seed to the train for cleaning purposes should write to the Agricultural Office, Cayuga, stating the kind of seed, amount, and the point to which he will bring it for cleaning.

The train will consist of three cars, one of which will contain power and hand seed cleaning machinery. The second car will contain exhibition material, demonstrating the benefits to be derived from the proper cleaning of seed grain. The third coach will be a lecture car in which lectures will be given by special speakers at 2.30 p.m. each afternoon.

Seed cleaning will be demonstrated each day from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Farmers who bring in their grains and seed to the cars for cleaning purposes will, of course, TAKE HOME their cleaned grain and the screenings.

## SANDUSK W. I.

## SEVERAL NEW BOARS PLACED IN THE COUNTY

Others Have Been Changed to New Locality

Extension of the bacon hog improvement work started three years ago when John Duff & Sons, Ltd., Hamilton, placed three pure bred York hogs at points in the Lake Erie shore district has taken place during the past year, during which, three more have been placed in the more northerly parts of the county. A new breeding line is now available at each of the six points, all the boars having been changed.

Three senior animals have each proven his worth, producing stock over fifty percent select of all litters on record.

The boar, Ira Chief, now located with Wray Parkinson, a mile south and a mile west of Hagersville, has a record of leaving about seventy-five percent select, which is the highest in the county.

A new boar has been placed with Geo. Miller, close to Jarvis. This young boar, Eridale Horseshoe Producer, is sired by the boar placed second in the open class at Nelles Corners, which is from the only Day-bell line in Canada and from a sow of outstanding line which also stood high in the open class at the Haldimand Bacon Hog Show.

In the Port Dover district, Fashion Plate Lad, recently located with C. A. Welch, is leaving a fine grading record well over fifty percent in the stock show being finished for market.

At Nanticoke, Botesford Bay is placed with F. A. Pratten. This boar also is leaving a very good record of stock production. It will be remembered that this is the fine young boar placed second over many older boars at Nelles Corners last fall.

The Junior boar which won the class for young boars at Nelles Corners has been placed with E. P. Murray, a mile east of Cayuga. This is a new location for the Duff boars and serves a neighborhood from which many boars are trucked direct to Hamilton.

At Selkirk, one of the original locations just a mile west of the village, at the farm of Harvey Schweyer with his co-operation, Duff's have established a breeding station where a number of pure bred sows are located, which are producing stock of the highest order. The object is to provide a source of supply of pure bred sows of the right type, which are proving themselves to be good producers of large strong litters of thrifty pigs and good feeders, and at prices reasonable and to suit the pocket of the average farmer. A number of fine young sows are at present available.
