PRESBYTERY TAKES CONTROL OF JARVIS AND WALPOLE CHURCHES

SIMCOE, July 25. - Jarvig and Walpole Presbyterian congregations, which voted against church union in 1925 and by a subsequent agreement smong themselves, decided to remain independent for a time, are now re- Tuesday in Simcoe. established, the unionists finally withdrawing and taking with them the books, treasury and keys of the Jarvis church and manse.

The final stage of the trouble was spent Monday in Toronto. passed yesterday morning, when, in presence of the congregation assembled at the Jarvis church and Sabbath school classes being conducted there and on the porch of the manse, the moderator of the presbytery directed the interim moderator of the church to have entrance made. This was easily effected without any destruction to property, and with the sssistance of a carpenter's screw driver the doors were thrown open and a relieved congregation entered.

During the intervening two years state. the independent status was tolerated by the presbytery to the stage where the unionists came to dominate, and finally at Jarvis arranged for the services of a United Church minister.
