## HON. C. H. FERGUSON'S MESSAGE TO THE PUBLIC CONCERNING WORK OF THE RED CROSS SOCIETY

The Hon. C. H. Ferguson, Prime Minister of the Province of Ontario and Minister of Education, has issued the following message to the public concerning the work of the Red Cross Society to which the Provincial Government has contributed the sum of \$30,000.00 in the forthcoming campaign for funds which will take place in Ontario on June 7, 8, 9 and 10—

"The Red Cross Society renders supreme service to humanity. It is the common meeting place of all peoples and nations who recognize the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of man. In Canada, as we know, the Red Cross Society stands ready to give help and succor wherever and whenever help and succor are needed. Money entrusted to this organization earns priceless dividends and serves to establish and maintain the best and the highest ideals of the race. Both in our densely populated centres and in the remote regions where the advantages of modern life are almost unattainable the Red Cross carries on its helpful work. I earnestly hope that the appeal now being made for funds will meet with a sympathetic response and fully realize the expectations of the Society, which are based on many years of experience of actual needs and have a legitimate claim upon every man, woman and child in this favoured country."
