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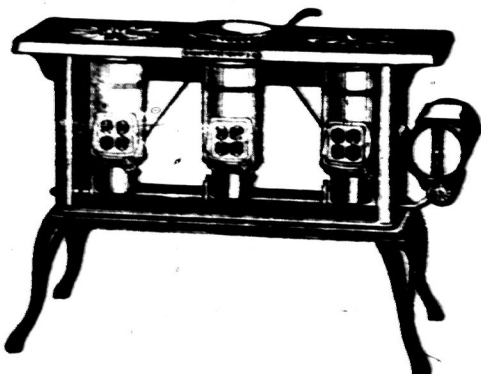

SUNDAY, MEMORIAL DAY.

At 10 a.m. the 91st Highlanders will hold a memorial service. The services in all the local churches at 11 a.m. will be in keeping with the great occasion of the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation.

At 1.30 p.m. the annual decoration day ceremonies of Norfolk lodge No. 225, I.O.O.F. will be held at the Port Dover cemetery. As was the case last year, the procession will "slow up" at the memorial avenue and wreaths will place in commemoration of the sacrifice made by those from this community who gave their lives in the service of King and Country. Following the ceremonies at the cemetery, the procession will return to Powell Park, where an address will be given.

In the evening there will be a service in Powell Park under the direction of the Norfolk County Ministerial Association. The service of song will be led by massed choirs, and after the service there will be a band concert featuring sacred music.

AMERICAN DAY, MONDAY.

The fourth day will be given over as American day, when it is expected that thousands of American citizens will flock to the port. The program will consist entirely of American sports and there will be plenty of attractions to keep the visitors busy. The entire celebration will be brought to a close with a street carnival and dance commencing at 7.30 p.m.

THERE'LL BE MUSIC APLENTY.

The bands engaged for the four-day celebration are the Port Dover Band; Waterford Band, Norfolk Rifles Band, Standard Pipe Band; Pipes of the 91st Highlanders; 91st Highlanders Bugle Band and the 3rd Canadian Machine Gun Bn. Bugle Band.

Throughout the celebration there will be a display of historical paintings and curios in the town hall, under the direction of Mr. Cantelon.

Business men of the Port are asked by the committee in charge to take an active interest, and to enter trade floats in the big procession. All owners of cars are urged to decorate their cars for this big event and help make up a celebration that will put Port Dover on the map for all time to come.

MRS. McWILLIAM HAD PASSED THE 90TH MILESTONE

Thursday afternoon there was borne to its last resting place in the beautiful Port Dover cemetery all that is mortal of Mrs. Mary McWilliam, a genial, kindly Scotchwoman, who after a brief illness passed away at her home, main street, on Monday last, the 6th inst.

Mrs. McWilliam, whose maiden name was Mary Mitchell, had been a resident of Canada for some 55 years, she and her husband, with their four eldest children having emigrated from Aberdeenshire, Scotland, and settled on what is known as the Scotch line, Norfolk County. The ocean trip at that time took 14 days, and was an epoch making event of those days. But Mrs. McWilliam lived to see the advance that had been made and the ocean had recently been crossed in thirty-three hours.

Robert McWilliam was a chief foreman of what is now the Air Line division of the C.N.E. and while engaged in this work passed away before attaining his fortieth year.

Some thirty-eight years ago Mrs. McWilliam removed to Port Dover, where she proved her worth as a mother, a citizen, a good neighbor and a church worker. She celebrated her ninetieth birthday on April 3rd of this year, on which occasion she was the recipient of many tangible tokens of the esteem in which she was held by her many friends.

Of Mrs. McWilliam's family of seven, Mrs. Annie Lowry of Windsor; Robert of Walkerville; George of Michigan City, Indiana; Mrs. Richard of Port Dover; Mrs. Henry Sinclair, at home; Mrs. R. Hyslop, Toronto; and William of Lundbreck, Alta. all were able to be present for the funeral services, which were conducted by the Rev. Donald MacInnes, pastor of Knox Church, with the exception of the last named.

There was a large gathering of relatives and friends present for the funeral services at the house and at the cemetery. Mr. MacInnes read words of consolation from the 14th chapter of St. John's gospel, and he read from the tattered and worn pages of the Bible of Mrs. McWilliam. This was no doubt her favorite chapter, for at the top had been written in pencil, although now almost illegible, the words "read these beautiful verses." The late Mrs. McWilliam had been a faithful worker in the church in her younger days, but even when she could not get out to the services in later years, she had nevertheless been an ardent Christian, and left an example that all might follow. The beautiful passage read had started with the words "Let not your heart be troubled" and the speaker pictured Mrs. McWilliam as one who had met many troubles in the task of raising her family after her life-partner had been taken from her many years ago. And yet he doubted very much if her troubles had ever been noted on the surface, if her cheery word had ever been withheld or the smile on her countenance lessened because of these troubles. He thought not. She had shared them with Her Pilot and had always trusted in Him. Her whole life had been one of service for the Great Pilot who had steered her course through her over four-score years. And while we mourn her death we must rejoice in the thought that her soul liveth for evermore, and she has seen the Pilot, whom she has loved and worshipped for so many years.

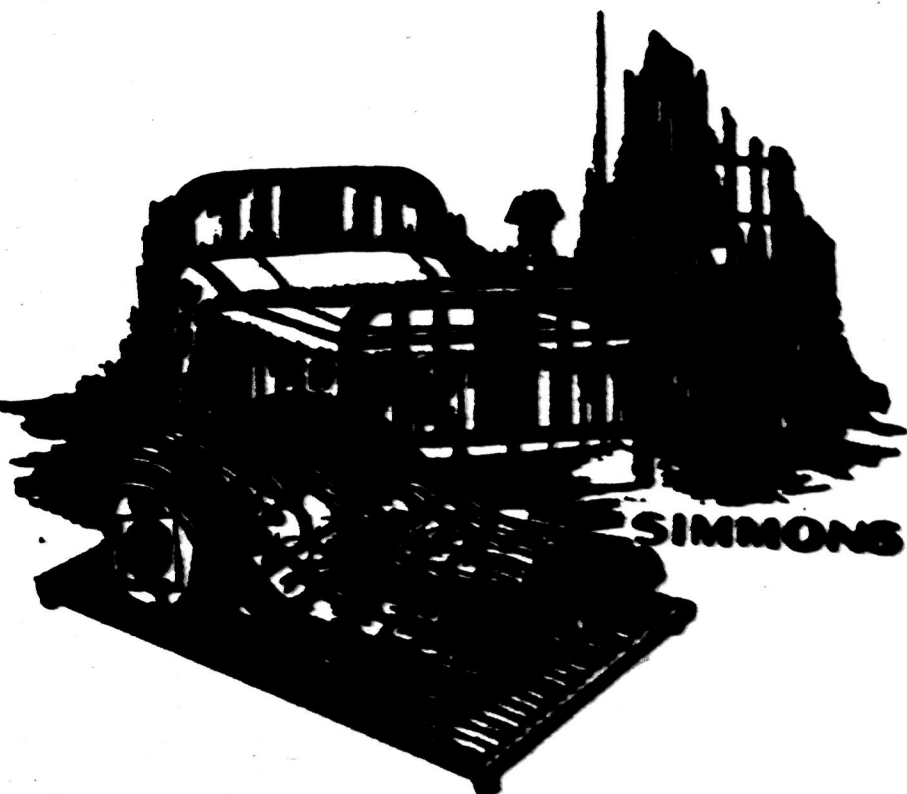
