Analysis of newspaper advertising and advertisers proves that advertising is not employed to create a de mand for unwanted merchandise, but is resorted to to stimulate an existing demand and to inform the buving public on products for which there is already a demand.

On the above practical theory of advertising one can leaf through the advertising pages of the newspaper and magazine and intelligently estimate relative demands for the advertised products. It does not always follow that the most widely advertised article is of better quality than another less widely advertised but, because of the relation of price to quality, the most highly advertised product is in greatest demand.


