Analysis of newspaper advertising and advertisers proves that advertising is not employed to create a demand for unwanted merchandise, but is resorted to to stimulate an existing demand and to inform the buying public on products for which there is already a demand.

On the above practical theory of advertising one can leaf through the advertising pages of the newspaper and magazine and intelligently estimate relative demands for the advertised products. It does not always follow that the most widely advertised article is of better quality than another less widely advertised but, because of the relation of price to quality, the most highly advertised product is in greatest demand.

**COMMUNITY ASSETS**

Under the caption "liabilities" in the fiscal report of cities and towns appear the amounts of their bonded indebtedness and unpaid bills. Bonds and bills are liabilities because they represent the public debt, but in a larger sense they may be the least of the community's liabilities.

Municipal bonds are as representative of the assets of a community as of its liabilities. That is a self-evident fact to those who realize that municipalities can only issue bonds for permanent public improvements and that every \$1,000 municipal bond stands for improvements costing \$1,000.

The bonds remain liabilities only until they have been redeemed, but improvements financed by those bonds remain permanent assets of the community.

So it appears that a community may have other and more burdensome liabilities than municipal bonds. One such liability may be the absence of community cooperation and public spirit. Lack of civic pride constitutes another community liability. Liabilities of this character give the community nothing and deprive it of much.

But community discord, civic slovenliness and public disinterestedness are redeemable liabilities. They cease to be a tax on the community when the public recognizes them as liabilities and undertake to liquidate them.

There is nothing cooperation can not accomplish for the community. Communities everywhere are proving the accuracy of that statement. Like individuals, any towns and cities are saying that whatever they have ever desired has been given to them if they only desired it earnestly enough. Such desire is not, however, the kind that waits for providence to grant its wish.

**Lending a Hand to Mother Nature**

Unfortunately Mother Nature made no provision for the growing army of Isak Walton in her scheme of things. Man supplements nature in re-stocking the trout streams of the Canadian Pacific Rockies, through the agency of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, which conducts artificial Cut-throat spawning and hatching operation in the Rockies each spring.

Authorities have estimated that only about three percent of all Cut-throat trout, eggs naturally spawned, hatch. The reason given is the desire of fish spawning at other times to feed on the newly laid eggs with the result that the embryos fertilize the eggs too late, when they have absorbed so much water that they cannot absorb the fertilizing fluid.

From 87 to 90 percent of eggs artificially spawned at Banff and Spray Lakes, hatch under artificial methods. This is how it is done:

before spawning time the trout are caught in nets, stripped, and returned to the streams, while the eggs from the female and fertilizing fluid from the male Cut-throat are mixed. In ten weeks the young fry is ready for its new home in the trout stream where it reaches the length of over eight inches in about four years.

The annual spring harvest of Cut-throat eggs at Spray Lakes—each female giving from 800 to 1,800 eggs—is about three-quarters of a million. At present 524,824 Lake Superior trout eggs, 172,918 Lake Superior Salmon Trout, 515,906 Rainbow, and 5,600,000 Pickeral eggs are hatching in the Banff Hatchery. The

hatchery for 1926 will also include one million Cut-throat eggs imported from Wisconsin and 250,000 from Spray Lakes, making a total of over eight and a half million eggs hatched in the Canadian Pacific Rockies to provide sport for anglers.

The outstanding example of the good results averting from this work begun in 1914, is the growing annual catch of Lake Superior Salmon Trout at Lake Minnewanka, about nine miles from the C.P.R. Banff Springs Hotel, while Spray Lakes, an easy riding trip from the Hotel is still the favorite Cut-throat fishing area in the Rockies, where fishing is as good as ever in spite of the growing number of anglers.

**HERE AND THERE**

Grain left Montreal for seventeen different countries in the 1926 season. Great Britain imported the heaviest export, followed in order by Holland, Germany, Belgium, Italy, France, Norway, Greece, Ireland, Portugal and South Africa. Great Britain took 39,291,763 bushels or 31 per cent. of the total exports from the Port, being also the heaviest purchaser of oats. Norway and Holland were the two largest buyers of rye.

The grain harvest of 1926 has left more money in the country than the greater harvest and somewhat higher prices of 1925, according to N. M. Paterson, president of the Paterson Steamship Company, and owner of a hundred country elevators in the West, with one other city elevator now being built at a contract cost of \$800,000 at Fort William. Mr. Paterson, who was interviewed at the Windsor Hotel in Montreal recently, having arrived from Winnipeg, is travelling with his father and mother, wife, six children and two nurses, by Canadian Pacific route, land and steamship to England with a view to staying at Bournemouth for the next three months.

Steamship companies brought approximately 165,000 passengers to the Dominion in 1926, an increase of nearly 45,000 over the previous year. Third class passengers, the majority of whom were immigrants or new settlers, accounted for over 125,000. An outstanding feature of travel has been the development of tourist third class accommodation. Approximately 7,100 passengers of this kind were carried eastbound across the Atlantic from Canada and 8,650 transported westbound during 1926, making a grand total of this kind of travel of 15,750 for the year.
