From His Head. National Guards were few and a majority of them were aliens or outsiders. It would be a good thing if every boy and girl, every man and woman in Canada, could have such an intimate knowledge of all that concerned the Dominion so closely. A great step in the right direction is shown by the establishment of Boys' Parliament in the provinces. Every town and city should have one and now that Women have equal rights a Girls' Parliament would also be beneficial. If one does not understand one cannot begin to appreciate and appreciation alone will beget regard and love, especially for one's homeland. Let us as good citizens make efforts towards a greater knowledge of our government.

I think loyalty also suggests Patriotism. During the war there was a great show of patriotic feelings—flag-waving, Red cross activities, Armenian drives and things of that sort. It was easy to feel excited over the Union Jack, then, to cheer and sing songs such as "Keep the Home Fires Burning," because the world was dashing around in a frenzy, people were keyed up with anxiety and emotion was maintained at high pressure. That, as I say, was during the war. But what now? One can no longer shout "Down with Kaiser Bill!" knit innumerable socks that were per chance all leg and no foot; or spend hours rolling bandages for the hospitals at the front. But one can show as great patriotism. Patronize Canadian Industries if you have Canadian woollens and American woollens offered you, choose the former by all means. If everyone bought out-of-Canada goods, what do you suppose would become of Canadian companies? They'd pull up stakes and quietly drift across the border. No doubt we'd buy the same goods labelled "Made in U. S. A." That's all right but where would Canada be in the meantime? She'd be down and out and it would be our own fault if we found the jingle in our pocketbooks not quite so jingly. Show your allegiance by buying our "Made in Canada" goods.

It's the same with reading matter. We have Canadian authors who are the best ever, but if we prefer Harold Bell Wright to Archie P. McKishnie and indulge that whim to the exclusion of McKishnie's books, which are really excellent, do you think he'd be encouraged to produce and add to Canada's fame? Certainly not! In the matter of periodicals, American publications are far more popular than those put out by Canadian presses. I admit the superiority of the magazines from across the lines, but then see what a head start they have, which it will take us some time to make up. I don't advise you to cut out all American magazines, but I would say don't confine your literary rambles to them alone to the detriment of our own publications.

Take for your motto "Boost Canada!" Our American visitors never fail to point out to us the advantages of their country. We are entirely too modest. We have unique features which no other country has. Take as one instance: our Hydro system. Norway is the only other country in the world which has a system which has any resemblance to ours, and even then there is no comparison. In fact Ontario has a monopoly of this.

We have the only successful public power line known. As a result we have thousands of acres of a minimum of cost which cannot be accomplished by companies, privately owned. So bring a bit with you, making yourself conspicuous. Meet of all convert the man who is vulgarly but aptly named "Howhard" to your cause—and then Watch Canada Grow.

When you decide to see the world, see Canada first. It's just the very best country on this old earth and does not look for some that might light the eyes. It is well blessed with every means of transportation and you'll enjoy yourself just as much on the transcontinental from coast to coast seeing the wonders of the apple orchards in the spring, the golden grain in the fall, as though you'd got smack on the Montclair on your way to see the Folies of Paris. Then when you go abroad what a tale will you unfold to strangers. Be loyal to your own land or the land of your adoption and don't hesitate to tell others the "whys" and "wherefores."

Loyalty cannot be bought. It is a part of your make-up, the same as greed and love and hate. It may be bred in one or acquired. You and I are loyal because we have been born Canadians. We have heard and read and sung "Canada" from infancy and believe implicitly. But the little children of foreigners, Roumanians, Armenians, etc. are loyal because their teachers have taught them to respect Canadian law and order; have made them understand the advantages the land of their adoption has given. They are educated. They associate with staunch Canadians and try to live up to a desire to be like them. Theirs is acquired but no less fervent loyalty. Patriotism is sustained by patriotic exercises in the schools. You remember the daily "Pledge of Allegiance" to the Union Jack which began "I pledge allegiance to my flag and to the country for which it stands." But for all that, the Union Jack does not excite our patriotism as the Stars and Stripes does that of our cousins to the south. The sight of a Star-Spangled Banner, the opening bars of the national anthem will raise a deafening cheer. No matter when or where. Hats are doffed, the crowd rises to its feet. Yet, we think, they haven't as much cause to be proud of that as we of our blood-stained but untrammelled Red, White and Blue.
