The fourth Eastern Liternational Dog Derby to be held from Quebec city February 21, 22 and 23, promises to be the most keenly contested ever held. It is expected that over 20 teams will be entered for the

Christmas tree shipments from Quebec to the United States ran to 450,000 over Canadian Pacific lines. last year, and present expectation is that this number will be equalled at least this year. Revenue to farmers of the province from this source ran to \$100,000 last year.

Special trains have been run from Winnipeg cirectly to the ship's side at Saint John, N.B.
