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## DEATH OF JAMES WHITWELL REMOVES JARVIS PIONEER

James Whitwell, a lifelong resident of Jarvis, passed away on Sunday last after an illness of several months' duration, in his 77th year.

Deceased was one of the best known men in Southern Ontario, being a well known hotel keeper in the Village 50 years ago. He was also in the mercantile business, in Simcoe for some years.

The funeral, which was largely attended, was held from his late residence on Tuesday, March 29th, with service and interment at the Anglican church in the Village. In the absence of Mr. W. A. Kyle through illness, the services were conducted by the Rev. C. J. Lamb, of Hagersville.

The pallbearers were: Gus Weil, Jos. Owen, John Wodham, C. S. McCarter, John Kindree and Geo. L. Miller.

## ESSAY ON CANADA

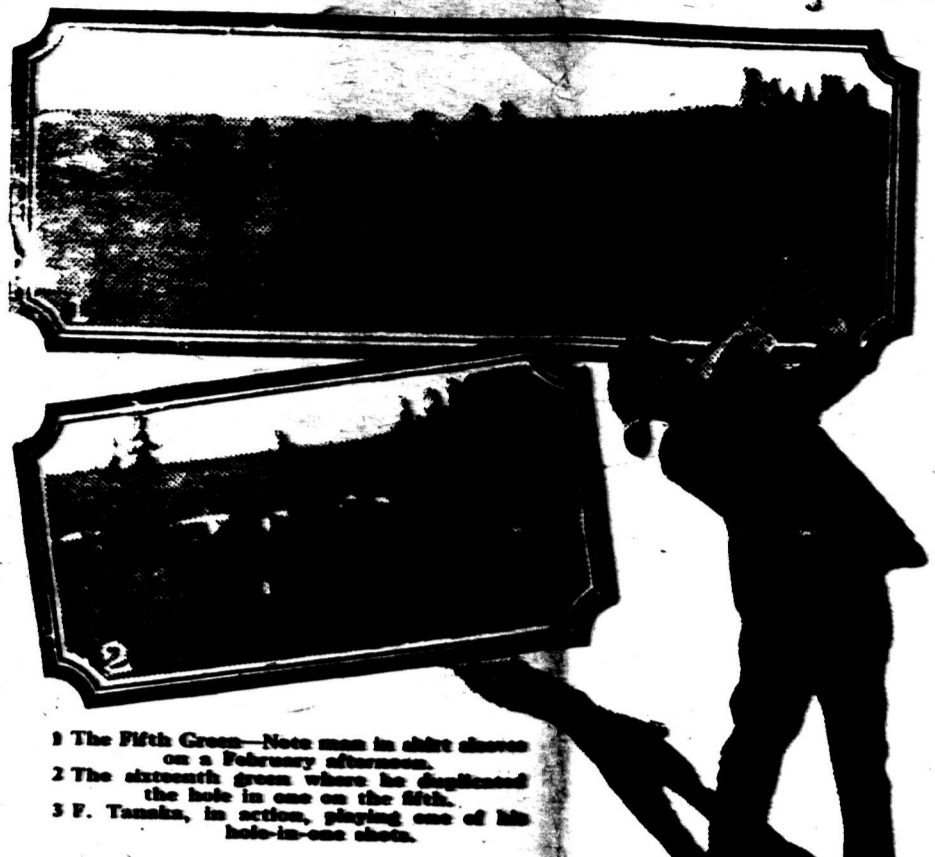

## A Feat Unequaled in Golf

F. Tanaka, local Vancouver golfer, went out for a round on the Canadian Pacific Railway "Langara" golf course one fine day in February this year and created a world's record when he holed his tee shot twice in one shot on the fifth and sixteenth green, a feat that has never been equalled in the history of golf. Mr. Tanaka before this was not known to fame, but now, of course, he jumps into the limelight. His shots were duly vouched for by prominent Vancouver golfers who were with him on the links at the time.

The "Langara" course was opened last year by the C.P.R., after construction at a cost of \$160,000. The golf course is well indicated by the photographs which show the fifth and sixteenth greens as they appeared on that February afternoon when Mr. Tanaka established the world.

On Friday evening last the joint congregation, of Knox Church, Jarvis and Chalmers Church, Walpole, met in the basement of Knox Church to tender a farewell to their esteemed pastor, Rev. W. T. Brown, who is leaving this week to take up his new charge in Buffalo, N. Y.

In spite of the condition of the road, the seating capacity of the building was taxed to the utmost. The ladies of the two congregations had prepared a bountiful supper to open the proceedings, after which an address and presentation was made to Mr. and Mrs. Brown. The address was read by Mr. Geo. L. Miller and the presentations, consisting of purses containing a sum of money, were made by Mr. Amos C. Porter.

The address follows:

To the Rev. W. T. Brown and Mrs. Brown:—  
We, the members and adherents of the joint congregations of Knox church, Jarvis, and Chalmers church, Walpole, gathered together at this time to offer to you and your good wife our deepest feelings of regret at your early removal from among us, cannot allow the gathering to disperse without in some small way offering a small tribute of praise for the energy and unselfish devotion you have displayed while ministering to us during the past four years.

Your work during the time you have labored in this portion of God's vineyard has been marked by the wonderful progress and prosperity of the united congregations over which you have been called to minister.

And now as we bid you God-speed and success in your new charge, we offer to you as a slight token of pleasant relation, and to your successful ministry while here, this small remembrance of your kindness to us all, trusting that though your body for a short time will be removed from us, that your spirit will continue to hover over us, and lead and direct us as in the past four years.

Mr. Brown feelingly replied on behalf of himself and Mrs. Brown.

Mr. W. G. Clark afterwards, speaking on behalf of Chalmers Church, took charge of a lengthy program of music and readings from several members of the congregations.

Sunday, March 27th, being the last Sunday of Rev. W. T. Brown's pastorate, the sermons both in the morning were in the nature of a farewell, and large congregations were in attendance. Both Wesley United and St. Paul's Anglican church withdrawing their evening service.

In the morning Mr. Brown addressed the member, of Knox church and in the evening his remarks were addressed to his many friends in the community as well as the members of his own church.
