Immigration to Canada for the eleven months of the calendar 1926 ended November 36, amounted to 130,569 persons, according to a recent statement issued by the Department of hamigration and Colonization. This is an increase of 61 per cent. over the same period of 1925, when the total immigration was 80.904.

The Macri Rugby Football team, who have recently completed a successful tour of France and Great Britain, passed through Montreal recently en route over the Canadian Pacific lines to Vancouver, where they sailed for New Zealand January 27 This team, wen, during their eight-month tour, 22 of 31 games played.

According to recent compilation by the Canadian Government, Canada now leads the world in public per capita distribution of electricity from central power stations. The figures of kilowatt-hours generated per capita per annum by the fiveleading countries are: Canada, 1,260; Switzerland, 886; United States, 581; Sweden, 467; Norway, 370.
