GO TO SUNDAY SCHOOL SUNDAY AND MOTHER'S DAY MAY 8

How much does the community owe to the Sunday School? What would be the moral and religious conditions if the community were deprived of this agency for the development and training of Christian character? It has been pointed out by leading statesmen of the past and present, that our present civilization can stand only as it rests upon strong moral and religious foundations. Secular education must be reinforced by religious education, if we are to have Christian character and Christian conduct. This is the task and responsibility of the home and the church, and requires the whole-hearted co-operation of parents and teachers to secure a united effort in the interests of childhood and youth.

In order to draw special attention to the place and importance of the Sunday School, and the part it plays in the building of character, a day is set apart once a year throughout Canada, and called Co-to-Sunday-School Day. It is held on the second Sunday of May, which falls this year on May 8th, and takes the form of a rally of all, both young and old, to join in the work of the Sunday School and to give it their enthusiastic support. Since this is also observed as Mother's Day, it therefore serves a two-fold purpose.

How can the two-fold purpose of this day best be fulfilled? We can give honor to those in the home who carry the burden of responsibility and especially to the mothers, who by their patience, their endurance, their loyalty and their self-sacrificing service, are helping to make earth "a little bit of heaven." We can encourage, by our interest and presence in the Sunday School the teachers and officers who are giving unselfishly of their time and effort to help boys and girls to more abundant Christian living. We can join with our children and young people in the special services in Church and Sunday School and resolve to put our influence behind this work in our own community and throughout the Province of Ontario.

A special program entitled "Country, Home and Mother" has been prepared for use in the Sunday Schools on that day and is provided without cost by the Ontario Religious Education Council. This is the interdenominational Sunday School organization for our Province and is responsible for the promotion and leadership of 200 conventions, 20 Boys' Camps, 8 Girls' Camps, 4 Summer Leadership Schools and 39 Standard Training Schools held during the year in various parts of the Province. The task is too great for any denomination to accomplish alone, and this co-operative program in which the various denominations are interested, calls for the loyal and generous support of all who are concerned with the moral and religious welfare of our boys and girls.

DAVID JOHNSON HANNA

GIBSON OF CALEDONIA ADDRESSES NANTICOKE CLUB

The 60 odd young people who gathered at the town hall, Nanticoke, on Friday, April 22, under the auspices of the True Canadian Club, enjoyed a very interesting evening.

President R. B. Hare took the chair for the short business session and opened the meeting by the singing of "O Canada," after which Harry Pratton was called to the chair for the program which consisted of "The Eye Opener," read by Harvey Vokes; a reading by Ethel Marshall; instrumental by Cora Henning; selections by the Club Male Quartette, and Community singing.

The main feature of the evening was a most interesting and inspiring address by James Gibson of Caledonia, member of the Older Boys' Parliament for Haldimand. Mr. Gibson, who is able to link his well-earned humor with great moral problems confronting us at the present, proven by history and statistics and verified by his witty jokes, made him commander of a most patient and attentive audience. In his address he pleaded for all true young Canadians to accept as their ideal the Four Square type of character that his order aimed for, believing the country and farm life to be the ideal place to breed character of the highest type, also the most conducive to happiness. Regretting that it too had its drawbacks and disadvantages, but after all it offered hope and to those that did not think it the only life, he begged to leave it at once and seek the better. Mr. Gibson hoped more would be like the Englishman who came out to Canada a man and died a farmer. He hoped all would live and die men and farmers. In closing his address he congratulated the Club on its many activities, hoping every member would give his or her all to the organization, stating they would receive just what they sowed.

The meeting closed with the National Anthem, after which lunch was served. The next meeting will be on May 6th. All young people invited.
