MISS CANADA CONTEST

RULES

1. Candidates must be endorsed by at least one responsible nominator.
2. Contest opens on Monday morning, May 9th, and closes Wednesday night, June 29th, at 10 o'clock.
3. Tickets sold shall range in value of votes, namely: a \$2.00 ticket 2000 votes; a \$1.00 ticket 1000 votes; a 50c ticket 500 votes.
4. The nominee polling the greatest vote shall be declared the winner and designated "Miss Canada."
5. Returns shall be made, ballots counted and results published weekly.
6. No candidate shall be allowed to transfer votes to any other candidate.
7. The candidate receiving greatest number of votes shall in addition receive a \$10.00 gold coin donated by James MacGregor, Caledonia; the second highest shall receive a \$5.00 gold coin; the third highest \$2.50 in gold.
8. The ballot box shall be at the office of the Secretary, kept locked and key deposited in the Bank of Commerce vault, opened only by the judges, who are Mr. B. E. French, Reeve of Caledonia, and Mr. T. S. Little, Manager of the Bank of Commerce, who shall count ballots and whose award shall be final.

Into the very jaws of death went they that we might be saved from the yoke of oppression and tyranny. What a beautiful sacrifice they made—for you, for me and for the world. Now let us give these ladies a helping hand, for

No matter what their task may be, They carry on or fall, Not for themselves, but for others, In God they place it all.

Remember, that when our boys were bidding us a last farewell before embarking for the Poppy Fields of Flanders, unaware that they would forever be sleeping beneath its now

bloody soaked soil, their last message to us was: REMEMBER US. Now they are gone. Yes, forever from this mortal life. Shall we forget their last words? Oh, no. Let us be faithful unto them who were faithful unto us and when we cross the Great Canada that simply divides them from us, we have proof to tell them WE REMEMBERED YOU. So let us take the united action and carry this banner of willingness and self denial to victory, then we will hold the Flower of our Hope bloom with greater brilliancy in the near future and then let it bloom forever on the Sands of Time. Let us take a lesson from the seventh verse of the second chapter of Second Timothy, "The Lord will help us in all our undertakings."

On behalf of Mrs. Roberts and myself I enclose a little help towards this worthy cause and which I ask you to kindly hand over to the Treasurer of the fund.

Canada's Diamond Jubilee has been the inspiration that led to the writing of a new Canadian song "At The Canada Jubilee" which has recently been published to commemorate the sixtieth year of confederation.

Its composer, Gordon V. Thompson, has already established the reputation of being one of Canada's leading song writers. His popular war songs composed and published during the stirring days of 1914-18 are well known. There are few who do not know by heart the airs of "When Jack Comes Back," "Khaki" or "When Your Boy Comes Back to You", three patriotic songs in particular composed by Mr. Thompson during the War.

Mr. Thompson composed this new song recently while staying at the Chateau Frontenac at Quebec. Here at the very birthplace of Canadian history Mr. Thompson felt the urge to write something that would express the joy of Canadians at the coming great event. Having produced "At The Canada Jubilee" Mr. Thompson felt that another song, expressing the optimistic sentiments of Canadians, would be exceedingly appropriate. "Land of Glad To-Morrows" was the result of this inspiration which the composer feels expresses something of the optimism for the future throughout Canada at the present time.
