NEW EDIFICE IS DEDICATED

Beaverton's New Presbyterian Church Opened With Appropriate Ceremonies—Large Attendance at the Services

The opening of the new Beaverton Presbyterian church on Sunday last April 24th, was an event in the history of this village and most remarkable in its success. Beautiful weather (with just that tang in it which made one feel the joy of living), and wonderful in the attendance of the worshippers, and in the spiritual uplift as given through the instrumentality of one of God's servants.

The special minister of the day was The Very Reverend, the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Rev. A. J. MacGillivray of Guelph.

The simple sacred and solemn service of dedication of the building to the worship of God was very efficiently performed by the Moderator.

The Moderator of Sessions, Rev. A. W. Hare, introduced Dr. MacGillivray showing how the church had been divinely guided in its selection of one who by physical, mental and spiritual endowments had guided its destinies through a very difficult and trying time, wisely and well. Dr. MacGillivray's address partook strongly of the human touch leading into the presence of the Master, and conveying to the hearts of the worshippers the sense of His ever present help, comfort, strength and support.

The choir, under the very able leadership of Mrs. Robt. West, rendered most appropriate anthems in a manner that was pleasing to all. In the morning, "Sing Hosanna in the Highest;" in the evening, "O How Amiable Are Thy Dwellings."

The Rev. W. G. Smith of Glenora, Moderator of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, assisted at the morning service.

The attendance at the evening service was so great that an overflow service had to be held in the town hall, where Rev. Robt. Simpson, of Woodville, preached a most inspiring sermon. Mr. J. Sprackman, of Toronto, with Mr. Horace Lapp as accompanist, rendering in their usual pleasing manner two fine solos in the church and also in the town hall.

Rev. R. S. Scott, of Cannington, conducted the devotional exercises at the evening service.

The offerings were most gratifying.

Monday evening the women of the congregation provided a most bountiful and appetizing supper which was partaken of by over 550 people. The attendance being so large that adjournment had to be made to the town hall where a most interesting program was rendered. The chair being taken by Rev. J. C. Robinson of Unbridge, Moderator of the Presbytery of Lindsay.

The following speakers and artists took part in the program: Rev. R. S. Scott, Cannington; E. C. Currie, Lindsay; J. H. Douglas, Sonya; Dr. J. Dodds, Bobcaygeon; W. L. Atkinson, Fort Perry; Rural Dean Rev. J. H. Kidd, Anglican clergyman of Cannington.
