### UNVEILING OF SOLDIERS' MEMORIAL MONUMENT

The unveiling of the Soldiers' Memorial Monument, as per program announced last week in The Record was performed on Sunday afternoon, October 30th.

Weather conditions were ideal for such a ceremony, and the assembly of people filled the town. At 2 p.m. the band from Simcoe, directed by their veteran leader, Mr. John Sutton, who by the way, was so generous that he brought the band and many others gratis, led the procession from Peacock's Hall followed by the Veterans down Main Street to the site of the monument, where seats had been provided and a platform erected for the speakers.

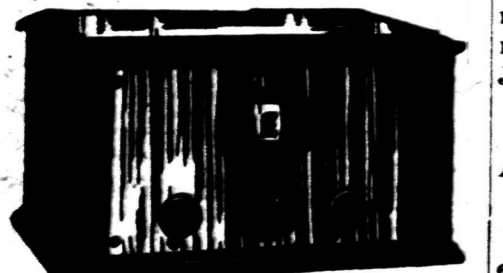
Mr. I. W. Holmes, in his usual happy manner, occupied the chair and opened the program by calling on the Rev. C. J. Lamb, who offered the dedicatory prayer asking the blessing of God on our Empire, the King and Queen, our Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, and all people. Rev. H. Brand read as appropriate Scripture for the ceremony the 46th Psalm. Following this the band played "Onward, Christian Soldiers."

The unveiling of the monument was done by Mr. John Church, and R. F. Miller, M.J.A., gave the unveiling address. Addresses were also given by Mark C. Senn, M.P., Mr. Lickers and Mr. Parsons. The salute was given by the Firing Squad, and the closing prayer offered by Rev. W. A. Kyle. Then the Veterans formed and led by Capt. Foster, marched back to the hall where the ladies of the Women's Institute furnished them refreshments.

The thanks and praise of the whole community are due the ladies of the Women's Institute for having planned and carried through to so successful issue this patriotic undertaking, and those ladies of the committee, Mrs. R. ### THE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Held in Peacock's Hall, Jarvis, Nov. 29, 1927 to Feb. 24, 1928, From 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Every Week Day Except Saturday

Young men of Jarvis district, this is your opportunity for a practical education.

The value of the course to you may be stated as follows:

1. Full course in Live Stock, judging, feeding, management, breeding, buildings, equipment, etc.
2. Practice will be given in judging wheat, oats, barley, peas, corn, potatoes, clovers, grasses, etc. Also recommended varieties, production of seed, cleaning, grading, marketing, etc.
3. A study of the breeds of farm poultry, poultry houses, operation of an incubator and brooder, the rearing of young stock, feeding poultry, killing, plucking, egg grading, poultry diseases, etc.
4. Teaches dairying, including sanitary milk production, milk and cream testing, cream separators, keeping of milk records, etc.
5. Teaches the care and management of bees.
6. Live stock diseases and how to control them.
7. Teaches all about farm buildings, farm water supply and sewage disposal, ropes, knots and splices, the use of concrete and how to solder.
8. Teaches the general principles of the gasoline engine and tractors, engine troubles and how to locate and remedy them.
9. A careful study of soils, drainage, fertilizers and their adaptation to the home farm.
10. Identification of weeds and weed seeds, methods of eradication and treatment of diseases of field crops, such as smuts, rusts, etc.
11. Instruction is given in the care of the vegetable garden and the orchard as well as sprays and spraying.
12. A full discussion of any farm problems which the students have on their home farms.

The cost of the course for each student is 50c per month.

Held in United Church School Room, Jarvis, Nov. 29, 1927 to Feb. 24, 1928, From 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Every Week Day Except Saturday

Young women of Jarvis district, this is your opportunity for a practical education.

The value of the course to you may be stated as follows:

1. A study of foods and cookery, menu-planning, table-setting, canning and preserving.
2. Teaches methods of laundering different materials, soap making, removing stains, ironing, dry cleaning, etc.
3. How to care for the home, labor saving devices, heating, ventilation, household accounts, plans of work, household pests and sanitation.
4. A study of houseplanning and decoration, showing how to furnish the different rooms of the home, with approximate cost.
5. Teaches what to do and how to do it when an accident occurs, nursing various diseases, general instruction for daily health and hygiene, taking temperature, pulse and respiration, disinfectants.
6. Instruction is given in all branches of sewing, including the use of patterns, garment making and re-modelling.
7. Millinery, including the making of shapes and flowers, covering the shapes and trimming.

The course in Home Economics also includes a practical course in English and Music.

The cost of the Course for each student is 50c per month.
