JARVIS SHORT COURSE COMMITTEE APPOINTED

Held Meeting to Discuss Business—
Secure Places to Board Students
—Rate Set at \$4.00

At the suggestion of the Agricultural Representative it was thought advisable to have a special committee appointed for the School of Agriculture and Home Economics. The duties of the members of the committee will not be many, but it is necessary to have some group of responsible people to whom they can go when requirements are needed for work in connection with the three months' school.

The duties of the Special Committee may be stated as follows:
1. To give out calendars to prospective students inquiring for same and record their names as students if they wish to sign.

2. To give a social reception and welcome to the students of the Three Months' School, on the first Friday of the course, December 2nd.

3. To supply what requirements are needed from time to time in the conducting of the school. Those in charge of the school will tell the committee what are required, but the demands along this line will not be very heavy.

4. To secure a list of boarding houses for students who may wish to board at Jarvis from Monday morning until Friday night.

5. To give a welcome to the lady instructors and make their stay at Jarvis as pleasant as possible.

6. To see that inquiries for creating an harmonious feeling between the students of the school and the people of Jarvis, so that the school may be 100% successful.

The staff of the Department of Agriculture at Cayuga greatly appreciate the fact that a Special Committee has been organized and wishes to thank them in advance for anything they may do to further the interests of the school. Their object here is to make the school at Jarvis the largest in the Province of Ontario.

THREE MONTHS' SCHOOL AGRICULTURE & HOME ECONOMICS

Held at Jarvis From November 29th 1927, to February, 24th, 1928

In this era of progress young men and women realize that it is necessary to take advantage of every opportunity of farm and home education such as the above Course brings to the heart of the Jarvis community. Last year the Course was held in Dunnville. Rhes Miller was one of the 94 young ladies who attended the School. After the course was over she expressed her opinion as to the value of the School in an essay on "What I Learned at the School of Home Economics, Dunnville."

"The past three months have proven very instructive and entertaining to me. Those who did not attend this course surely missed a treat and a good education in what we ought to know. In Home Nursing we had practice in bed-making, turning a sick patient, bandaging and artificial respiration. We were told what to do in case of drowning, fainting, shock, suffocation, sunstroke, heat exhaustion, dislocations, sprains, broken bones, wounds and hemorrhages. We learned how to care for pneumonia and typhoid patients. Contagious diseases were outlined to us and instructions given how to care for them; how to fumigate a house after a contagious disease; care of the mother and baby; how to take temperature, pulse and respiration; disinfectants; baths; hot and cold packs and how to equip a sick room."

The above is only one paragraph from a 3-page essay on what this young lady learned at the School. This goes to show that young ladies cannot afford to let this opportunity pass by without taking advantage of it. Therefore decide to attend the School and mail your name and address to the Agricultural Office at Cayuga.

Similar extracts could be quoted from essays written by students of the Class in Agriculture, but time and space will not permit.

The total enrolment up to Nov. 14 is 72 students—42 girls and 30 boys. Their names appear elsewhere in this issue.
