We know that the Course is going to be interesting, entertaining and instructive and that you will not want to miss it. The equipment you require is a notebook and pencil.

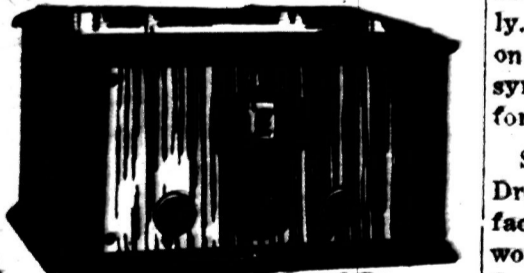
