## SEVENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL FALL FAIR

The 74th annual exhibition of the Jarvis Agricultural Society is now a thing of the past. The Fair held on Wednesday and Thursday of last week was all that could be desired under the existing circumstances. Rain threatened all Wednesday afternoon and about night a steady rain set in which the old prophets declared to be a three day spasm, but fortunately Thursday morning broke clear and it had every appearance of a full days respite. By noon the sky looked threatening, and at 4 o'clock the downpour came in earnest, making it very miserable indeed for the exhibitors to remove their exhibits from the hall. It also broke up a very exciting game of soft ball between the Hamilton Dairies and the Graftons of Hamilton, the result when the game was called being 4-1, in favor of the Graftons.

The attendance on Thursday was about the same as last year, but the five stock exhibits, particularly in horses, was far ahead of the last few years, in fact the only falling off in any department was Roots and Vegetables, and Horticulture, this being accounted for owing to the extremely dry weather of the past two months and an early frost.

Conspicuous by their absence was the usual midway fair, and hot dog stands, this being accounted for, for the usual Departmental notice to the several Ontario newspapers being given as September 29th and 30th, and as this was a typographical error, really no blame could be attached. The dance in the arena at night was not as successful as predicted, but taking into consideration the nature of the weather, the directorate should be well pleased to have a balance on the right side.
