Good Roads Committee Report

We have examined the accounts and pay lists submitted by the superintendent and recommend that they be paid.

The Warden, members of the Good Road Committee, and superintendent, accompanied by Mrs. McInnes made a two days' inspection of the County Highway System and found conditions very satisfactory. There is to date 20 miles of road graded and road entrance culverts installed. A greater portion of the McAdam roads and gravel roads have been repaired and stock piles placed on the side of

Your committee have selected Road No. 11, Division 4, and Road No. 17. Divisions 1, 2, 3; also Road No. 16 Division 2. These roads will be resurfaced before the next meeting of the Council, and the balance of the appropriation will be distributed over the balance of the system where repairs are needed.
