## AGRICULTURAL FIELD MEETING

The experimental plots situated on the highway 2 1/2 miles west of Simcoe (next to the County Home) were never looking better and there are many lessons to be learned about growing of alfalfa and sweet clover; soil treatment; use of lime; phosphates and potash; also dates of seeding on sandy soils.

A field meeting will be held at the plots on Saturday, October 15th at 2 p.m. sharp.

Professor R. Harcourt, of the Department of Chemistry, O. A. College will address the meeting, also a member of the Field Husbandry Department will be there to discuss crop varieties, rotation, methods of handling alfalfa and sweet clover, etc.

The most economical way to maintain and improve the fertility of our soils is to grow and plow under the sweet clover and use alfalfa in the rotation.

Come and see the results and how it is done on soil which was considered worthless a few years ago.

### First Aid Champions of C.P.R. Lines

The Shagnessy grand challenge cup, emblematic of the First Aid Championship for all lines of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company was carried off recently by the Toronto Freight Offices in competition with the Western Shops of Winnipeg, holders of the Western lines cup. The competition took place at the Place Viger Hotel in Montreal recently between the two teams who were declared winners of eastern and western lines competitions held prior to the final tests. The winning team secured a total of 419 points out of a possible 610, while the Winnipeg team were 16 points behind. The competitors were in accordance with the rules of the Ambulance Association regulations.

## HERBERT W. ROBERTS HONORED

After a continuous stretch of 26 years as correspondent for the Canadian of Belleville, Mr. H. W. Roberts, of Toronto, thought it time for a change, so decided to try for higher realms of activity. This was 6 years ago and when it became known he was about to quit the Canadian, the management of the Deaf-Mutes Journal of New York lost no time in seeking his service as their official Canadian representative, at the same time offering him liberal inducements.

After considering the offer for some time, Mr. Roberts accepted the offer and has been their sole representative in this country ever since. At that time the Journal had but a very few Canadian readers, but when it became known that Mr. Roberts had cast in his lot with this great weekly publication, its Canadian circulation soon began to grow by leaps and bounds, until today it boasts of several thousand Canadian readers among its weekly readers of over 80,000. Since Mr. Roberts assumed this post his writings have drawn the friendship of the Deaf of these two countries more closely together.

As a personal tribute to Mr. Roberts the Editor in Chief, William A. Renner, and an associate decided to pay their Canadian scribe a visit and

confer with him on future problems and his work. This they did recently and on their return the Editor had the following to say of their visit to Canada:

## A NEW YORKER VISITS CANADA

## COUNTY COUNCIL

Cayuga, Thurs., Sept. 22 Council met pursuant to adjournment. All the members present.

### Communications Committee

Was adopted as follows:  
1. Letter from the Department of Highways enclosing order-in-Council approving bylaw 837 amending the system of County roads. Filed with the Clerk.

2. Letter from the Department of Education that the following are the amounts of the grants apportioned to the High Schools for the year 1927:  
Caledonia ..... \$1836.32  
Hagersville ..... 1430.47  
Cayuga ..... 1377.25  
Dunnville ..... 1171.50  
Filed with Clerk.

3. Letter from the Department of Public Works that Dominion Government will not continue the maintenance of York bridge. Referred to Committee of the Whole.

4, 5, 6. Letter from Hamilton City Hospital re indigent patients. Referred to Committee of the Whole.

7. Letter from Toronto General Hospital that Joseph H. Phillips was admitted as an indigent patient there and that the County will be charged for his maintenance. Referred to the Committee of the Whole.

### Report of Supply Committee

Was adopted as follows:  
That we purchase a heavy duty gas range from McClary's, Toronto, the price \$193.65 delivered at Dunnville, for the House of Refuge.

### Road and Bridge Committee Report

Was adopted as follows:  
We recommend payment of the following accounts:

### Home Committee Report

Was adopted as follows:  
There are at present 31 inmates, 13 females and 18 males. Health fair. We have examined the Children's Aid Society and House of Refuge accounts, find them correct, and would recommend them to the Finance Committee for payment.

### Building Committee Report

Was adopted as follows:  
1. We recommend that three lights instead of two be put in the Court House grounds.

2. We further recommend that the chairman be authorized to have the north west corner of the registry office repaired and one room papered, and the ceiling and one room papered in the Gaoler's residence.

We recommend that the contract awarded to W. H. Lishman for plastering the gaol wall be rescinded, and that the contract for same be awarded to Arthur Tambling at \$300, the county to supply the material.

We recommend that the committee be empowered to engage a carpenter to oversee the building of a garage, and that the work be done by the prisoners.

### R. S. Colter, Chm.

A bylaw was finally passed declaring that all bridges of 20 feet or less on boundary lines between local municipalities or on county boundary lines, revert to the local municipality, and setting out a list of the bridges over 20 feet in width on boundary lines which have been assumed by the County.

### Good Roads Committee Report

We have examined the accounts and pay lists submitted by the superintendent and recommend that they be paid.

The Warden, members of the Good Road Committee, and superintendent, accompanied by Mrs. McInnes made a two days' inspection of the County Highway System and found conditions very satisfactory. There is to date 20 miles of road graded and road entrance culverts installed. A greater portion of the McAdam roads and gravel roads have been repaired and stock piles placed on the side of the road.

Your committee have selected Road No. 11, Division 4, and Road No. 17, Divisions 1, 2, 3; also Road No. 16, Division 2. These roads will be resurfaced before the next meeting of the Council, and the balance of the appropriation will be distributed over the balance of the system where repairs are needed.

It is the intention of the committee to have stock piles placed on all mac-
