## HALDIMAND COUNTY LIVE STOCK JUDGING COMPETITION

The combined "Royal" and "County" Judging Competition was held in Dunnville on Tuesday, October 18th. Although 35 entries were received, on account of the unfavorable weather, only 25 young men were present. The competition was very keen and great interest was shown by those taking part. The contestants were required to judge five classes of live stock, poultry, and five classes of grain and small seeds.

The Judges then gave the correct placings of the different classes, which were very interesting and educational and will be of great value to the young men.
