LIGHTS ON HORSE VEHICLES COMPULSORY OCTOBER 1

Applies to Horse-Drawn Conveyances on Ontario Highways at Night; Four-Wheel Brake Signs Also Are Required

Beginning on October 1st, all vehicles using the highways at night must carry lights and all cars equipped with four-wheel brakes must display in the rear a small triangular brake sign that has been approved by the department of highways.

There should be no difficulty in enforcing the latter amendment. But in solving the problem of light on horse-drawn vehicles the department may experience difficulty.

The danger of carrying a lighted lamp on the back of a load of hay is obvious. Provision was made in the amendment to allow the department to exercise discretion. It may allow the use of reflectors.

The amendment reads as follows: "Subject to the provisions of clause B, every vehicle other than a motor vehicle or a bicycle or a tricycle, when on the highway after dusk and before dawn shall carry in a conspicuous position on the left side thereof a lighted lamp showing white to the front and red to the rear. Any lamp so used shall be visible at a distance of at least 200 feet."

Penalty for noncompliance for the first offense is not over \$5; for the second not less than \$5 nor more than \$10, and for each subsequent offense not less than \$10 and not more than \$25.

Hon. George S. Henry stated that these two amendments would be enforced promptly.

"How generally will the use of reflectors be permitted?" "Very strictly limited."

INDUCTION AT CHRIST CHURCH

On Friday, September 2nd, the Right Reverend Derwyn T. Owen, D.D., Lord Bishop of Niagara, accompanied by Mrs. Owen and their two sons, Secrett into the Rectorate of Christ Church.

Soon after 4 p.m., the Bishop conducted a "Quiet Hour," which was greatly appreciated by the large number of church people who attended. The next hour was a social period, affording ample opportunity for those present to meet His Lordship and Mrs. Owen. Dainty refreshments were served by the members of the Women's Auxiliary.

At 7:30 p.m. the service of induction commenced. Following the choir in the procession were several clergymen, including Rev. Henry W. H. Brand, B.A., of Elora, and the Rev. C. J. Lamb of Hagersville, both former Rectors of the Parish; also the Rev. W. H. Kyle, M.D., of Jarvis, and the Rev. D. L. Cornish of Port Dover; also Mr. Warren Jackson, Rector's Warden, who presented the keys. The opening prayers were said by the Rev. H. W. A. Brand, and Rev. Dr. Kyle read the license. DISASTROUS FIRE AT SAN- DUSK—BRIGADE MAKES RUN

The neighborhood was suddenly alarmed on Saturday afternoon, when fire broke out in the barn of Mr. David Hill. In some mysterious manner a spark was blown into the haymow and in a very few minutes everything was aflame and the barn and building, hay straw, grain, seed also the separator and six pigs were completely consumed.

For a time the house was threatened, but by quick service of the crowd that gathered, it was saved. Part of the oats were shovelled from the ruins and saved.

The Jarvis Fire Brigade was called and in about 15 minutes were at the scene. Even during this short space of time the buildings were practically burned to the ground. About all the assistance the firemen could offer was to help reduce the flames to prevent them from spreading to the residence.

The loss is partly covered by insurance.
