LIGHTS ON HORSE VEHICLES COMPULSORY OCTOBER

Applies to Horse-Drawn Conveyances en Ontario Hightways at Night; Four-Wheel Brake Signs Also Are Required

Beginning on October 1st, all vehicles using the highways at night must carry lights and all cars equipped with four-wheel brakes must the week-end at the parsonage. display in the rear a small triangular brake sign that has been approved by the department of highways.

There should be no difficulty in enforeing the latter amendment. But in solving the problem of light on horse drawn vehicles the department may experience difficulty.

The danger of carrying a lighted last. lamp on the back of a load of hay is obvious. Provision was made in the amendment to allow the department to exercise discretion. It may allow the use of reflectors.

"Subject to the provisions of clause village. B, every vehicle other than a motor vehicle or a bicycle or a tricycle, when on the highway after dusk and before down shall carry in a conspicuous position on the left side thereof a lighted lamp showing white to the home after spending a few days at front and red to the rear. Any lamp Port Dover. so used shall be visible at a distance of at least 200 feet."

Penalty for noncompliance for the first offense is not over \$5; for the second not less than \$5 nor more than \$10. and for each subsequent offense not less than \$10 and not more than her duties as teacher.


