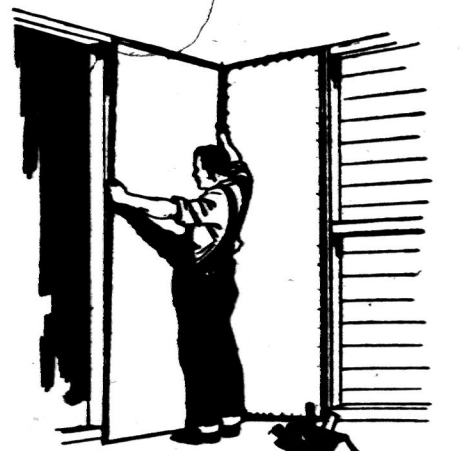

NORFOLK ENTERTAINS

even the most skeptical became convinced that the station was a wonderful asset. The chief object was the renewing of the forests which had passed away, and reclaiming the waste land. Only the poorest and most unproductive land is being reforested, the object being to make the land of the province fully productive. He extended a hearty welcome to the party and assured them that he would be pleased to advise them in any undertaking in the way of reforestation.

Mr. J. W. Townsend, chairman of the Norfolk Reforestation Committee spoke briefly on the advantages to be gained by becoming acquainted and helping solve the problems of the day.

A vote of thanks to the ladies was moved by J. G. Branshill, and seconded by R. S. Coulter of Cayuga. George L. Miller, reeve of Jarvis, also spoke appreciatively of the county of Norfolk.

Following the luncheon the seventeen cars conveyed the party by way of St. Williams and Port Rowan to the plantation of Mr. Bronson, concession 4, South Walsingham, where there are about 100,000 trees in various stages of growth. Journeying on to the county plantation east of Walsingham centre, where a 100-acre parcel had been planted, passing then to the county gravel pit in the 14th was inspected, the party proceeded to the tobacco area in the vicinity of Lynedoch. Here they were met by Mr. Pelton, who took charge and showed them through the fields of tobacco, and afterward introduced them to the drying kilns, where the tobacco was in the curing stage.

The party arrived back at the court house, Simcoe, at 5:30 p.m. and after the usual felicitations dispersed, having spent a most enjoyable time and all hoping it would become an annual event.

SELF SERVICE.

Many good folk are lamenting the passing of the era when man and women consecrated their lives to unselfish service and prepared themselves to become ministers, missionaries, teachers or country doctors that they might administer to the spiritual, mental, and physical needs of humanity without thought of large worldly gain. They are not in error when they charge that modern men and women are choosing vocations today in which they can do the greatest service to themselves.

People today are coming to the belief that the best way they can help others is to produce much that their profit shall be large and that they shall never become dependent upon society. The old idea of service was direct. The new service is indirect. Twenty years ago it was still thought that only ministers, doctors and teachers served humanity. Today every workman who carries his whole day's wage home is known to have earned that wage in service to society.

Elbert Hubbard's version of the Golden Rule was, "Do unto others as though you were the others" but an even more up-to-date version is "Do yourself much good and no bad to others." Getting something for yourself is reprehensible only when it is gotten at the expense of another.
