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C FEATHERSTONE DROWNED

Chester Featherstone, of Dunnville, was drowned in Lake Erie at 5 p.m. on Sunday. Mr. Featherstone, in company with five other men was on a fishing expedition off Tecumseh Reef. At 5 o'clock the party decided to return and were turning their boat around when Mr. Featherstone was washed overboard. He sank in 14 feet of water and never came to the surface. At time of going to press we were unable to learn whether the body had been recovered.

Deceased, who is well known in Jarvis, is survived by his wife and one son, David, eight years of age.

HAGERSVILLE YOUNG MAN KILLED AT R. R. CROSSING

A distressing fatality occurred on Thursday forenoon, Sept. 8th, at the M.C.R. crossing at Brookfield Station, east of Welland, when Chester Davidson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Davidson, of Hagersville, met his death.

The deceased was a truck driver in the employ of Kett Bros., and was hauling stone at the time. Before crossing the track he had been watching a freight train which was approaching, but apparently did not notice the locomotive which was running light and coming from the opposite direction and travelling at a great speed. The impact was terrific and Chester and the truck was hurled a distance of over 100 feet.

The unfortunate young man was still alive when picked up, but only survived for a few minutes. The truck was almost completely demolished. An inquest was held.

The remains were brought to Hagersville for burial, the funeral being held on Sunday, Sept. 11th from the home of his parents. A very large concourse of relatives and friends attended the last sad rites. The service was conducted by the Rev. E. W. Brearley, of the United Baptist church, who acted for Rev. A. L. Budge, of the Presbyterian church, who was out of town. Interment took place in the Hagersville Cemetery. The floral tributes were many and beautiful, testifying to the esteem in which the young man was held by his many friends.

The sympathy of the community is extended to Mr. and Mrs. Davidson and family in their very sad and untimely bereavement.
