Chester Featherstone, of Dunnville, was drowned in Lake Erie at 5 p.m. on Sunday. Mr. Featherstone, in company with five other men was on a fishing expedition off Tecumseh Reef. At 5 o'slock the party decided to return and were turning their boat around when Mr. Featherstone was washed overboard. He sank in 14 feet of water and never came to the surface. At time of going to press we were unable to learn whether the
