WILL PAY DAMAGES

Mr. G. E. Mason of Toronto, who is charged with criminal negligence in connection with the accident on No. 3 provincial highway on August 15th, in which his car struck that of Mr. John Deming, causing the latter to overturn in the ditch, and following which Mrs. Deming died in the hospital here, appeared before Police Magistrate Gunton for the third time on Monday last. Mr. Mason had elected to be tried by judge and jury, but the magistrate held that there was not sufficient evidence to send the case further on a criminal charge, although he considered that it might be otherwise, had the charge been a civil one. And on the understanding that Mr. Mason pay all damages in the way of hospital bills, damages to Mr. Deming's car, etc., the case was allowed to drop. We understand that the matter has been arranged satisfactorily by the lawyers on both sides.—Simcoe Recorder.

Find Body of C. Featherstone

AFTER WEEK'S SEARCH BODY DROWNING VICTIM RECOVERED AT PATTON'S POINT, SIX MILES FROM SPOT WHERE ACCIDENT OCCURRED

DUNNVILLE, Sept. 25.—After a week's search, in which hundreds of citizens, tugs, gasoline launches and an airplane assisted, the body of Chester Featherstone, prominent local man, who was drowned in Lake Erie last Sunday afternoon while fishing, was found at 10 a.m. today on the beach at Patton's Point, about six miles east of the point off which Mr. Featherstone was thrown into the water when a big wave caused the boat in which he was to roll badly to one side.

The body had been washed ashore

and was found by three local men, Howard Mack, Harry Friesman and J. Costak, who were searching the beach, with nearly 100 others for the remains. Dr. Thurst, coroner, of Dunnville, was notified, and he in turn summoned Provincial Constable Page, with whom he took charge of the remains. The coroner's examination convinced him that death was due to accidental drowning and there will be no inquest.

The body was taken to the funeral parlors of John Clark, where it remained until Tuesday, when the funeral left at 1.30 p.m. for Sweet's Corners Cemetery, where interment was made, followed by a service in the Church of Christ, adjoining. The funeral was under the auspices of the Masonic order.
