## COUNTY COUNCIL

### THIRD SESSION—FIRST DAY

Cayuga, March 26th, 1928

Council met at the call of the Warden to consider the Good Roads Program for 1928 and the County finances.

All the members present with the Warden in the chair. McDonald-Miller—That this Council resume business with the Warden in the chair. Carried.

The minutes of the last meeting were then read.

Aldridge-Saunders—That the minutes of last meeting be adopted as read. Carried.

Colter-Lockie—Whereas it appears from the Department Engineer's report of the Department of Public Works that an expenditure of \$2550 is necessary to put the York bridge in a good state of repair. And whereas it appears that the Minister will recommend this to be done provided the County undertake to take over the bridge after this money has been expended upon it.

That the County of Haldimand undertake to take over the said York bridge after the said money has been spent on the bridge put in a good state of repair by the Department of Public Works. Carried.

Colter-Kern—That this Council resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider the report of the Good Roads Committee with Reeve Sherk in the chair. Carried.

### REPORT OF GOOD ROADS COMMITTEE

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:  
Gentlemen—We, your Good Roads Committee, beg leave to submit the following report:  
Would recommend that the appropriation for maintenance and construction for the season of 1928 be \$100,000, as follows:  
Maintenance \$30,000; construction \$70,000.

Would recommend that the 27 miles of earth roads which were graded during 1927 receive a base course of metal. The roads to receive the same are as follows:  
Road No. 11—Norfolk County Line to Cheapside Side Road, distance 7 miles.

Road No. 11—Cheapside Side Road to Rainham Centre, distance 6 1/2 miles.  
Road No. 12—From Fisherville to end of metal in South Cayuga, distance 5 1/2 miles.

Road No. 1—From Lincoln Line to end of metal, distance 3 miles.  
Road No. 5—From Cranbrass to Cranston, distance 3 miles.  
Road No. 15—From Attercliffe Station to Welland Line, distance 2 miles.
