He helped materially in compiling a mailing list of prospective students, he awarded books to the best students in Agriculture and Home Economics, and he attended all the Class Receptions and delivered an address at one of our regular Literary Meetings. In addition to the assistance at the Jarvis School he has taken an active interest in the Three Months' School at Dunnville and Caledonia and is of the opinion that the Three Months' Schools are an educational opportunity which should not be overlooked by students who may be classed as adolescents.

CLOSING EXERCISES

On Friday, February 24, the Closing Exercises of the Jarvis Three Months' School were held in Peacock's Hall. The program consisted of musical numbers such as choruses, solos, duets, instrumental numbers, etc., presentation of boys' certificates and prizes; presentation of girls' certificates and prizes; hat parade; dress parade; and a special presentation to the best student in Agriculture and the best student in Home Economics by Mr. J. L. Mitchener, I.P.S., and for the best Agricultural Library by C. C. Main. Professor W. R. Graham was present and gave a most interesting address for three-quarters of an hour which was greatly appreciated by an audience of over 400 people. The hall was darkened and all the numbers were staged by special lighting—footlights and a spotlight from the gallery in the rear. A special feature of the program was the hat parade and dress parade. All the hats and dresses were made by the girls of the School of Home Economics. The program lasted for approximately three hours. From 6 to 7 p.m. the Ladies' Aid of the U.I.T. Church served an Old-fashioned Hot Supper to over 125 students. After the supper suitable presentations were made by the students to the staff. From 7 to 11 the students assembled in Peacock's Hall and had their closing dance.

FOLLOWUP ORGANIZATIONS

Owing to the fact that there are many organizations in the community it is doubtful whether or not it would be advisable to organize a Junior Institute.

In Nanticoke they have a U.F.Y. P.O. and for the same reason it may not be advisable to organize a Junior Farmers' Association.

There is a feeling, however, that a club should be formed which may materialize at a later date.

SUMMARY

The consensus of opinion of the students who have attended the Jarvis Three Months' School would indicate that these classes are valuable and well worth while. They seem to be filling a long-felt want in the educational system of our county and are especially suitable for students who may be classed as adolescents.

In conclusion we are proud to state that the Jarvis Three Months' School was the largest and best in the Province of Ontario in 1927-28, and the credit for this successful School should be given entirely to the organizations and individuals in the Jarvis district as well as the pupils themselves who were progressive enough to take advantage of this valuable educational course.

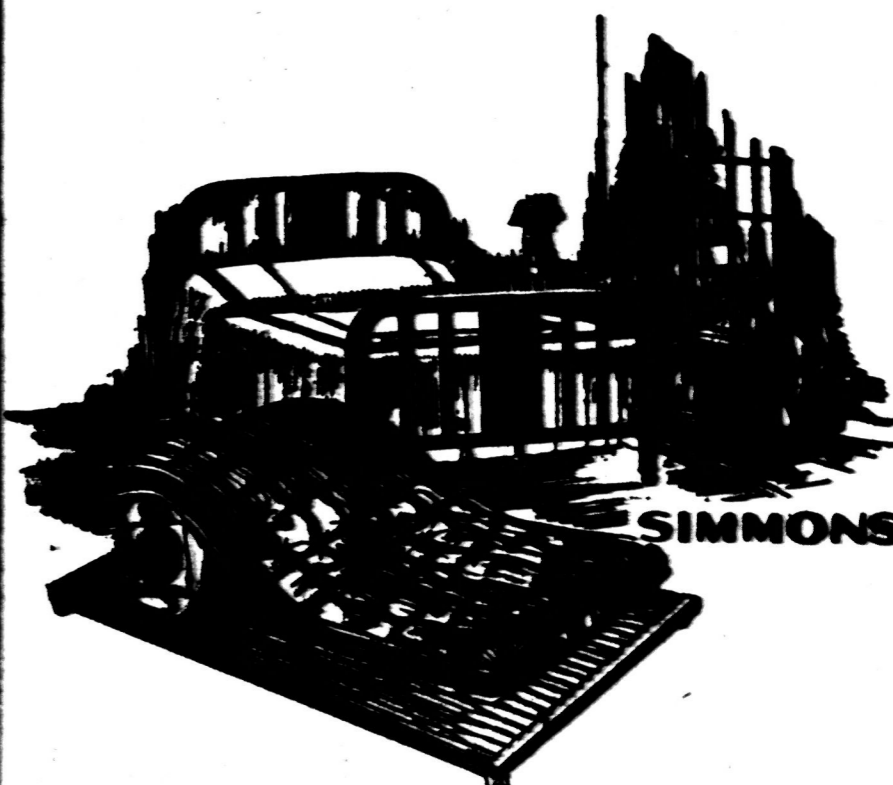
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
