## COAST TO COAST DRIVE—LEAGUE OF NATIONS DAY

National Event to be Celebrated on Thursday, April 14th

The League of Nations was inaugurated in January, 1920. A response to the universal cry of humanity for delivery from the destruction and slaughter of the flower of manhood—the immeasurable suffering of countless women and children, and the destruction of wealth. With all due reverence and respect for the bravery of these eleven million men who fought and died in the Great War, we make this statement, that even a finer phase of heroism than that which faces guns on a field of battle may show in seeking to make such guns unnecessary.

It is to be hoped that ministers, presidents of young people's organizations, Women's Institutes, I.O.D. E. and others, will arrange to have some one prepare an address on the wonderful accomplishments of the League of Nations to be given at their regular meeting.

"Nothing is more essential than a strong and enduring League of Nations. Millions of British men and women stand ready to help if only they be shown the way. I commend the cause to all the citizens of my Empire."

## LOCAL SNIPER TIES IN HANDICAP SHOOT EVENT

Sixty shooters from Canada and the United States took part in the Hamilton Gun club shoot on Friday last.

W. H. Patterson, of Buffalo, was high man over the entire program of 220 targets, with 202. N. Long, of Hamilton, was next with 201.

N. Long was high in the 140 singles with 134, and had the largest straight run of the day, breaking 77 targets straight.

The handicap event was featured by the good shooting of Miss M. Wilson, of Buffalo, who smashed 49 out of 50 from the 19-yard mark and tied for high with W. Hodge, of Jarvis, also shooting from the same distance.

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## Niagara Peninsula Restricted Area

The Above Area Includes the Counties of Haldimand, Lincoln, Welland and Wentworth

An organization meeting was held in the Agricultural Office, Hamilton, on Friday, February 7th. This meeting was attended by ten representative prominent farmers from each county and was addressed by E. W. Wade of the Live Stock Branch, Toronto; J. W. Richardson, Caledonia R.R. No. 2, and D. Hunter, Caledonia R.R. No. 2, and the Secretary is Ross Martindale, Caledonia R.R. No. 3. In addition a committee of three men together with the Agricultural Representative to act as Secretary was appointed for each county.

A second meeting was held in the courthouse, Welland, on Friday, March 2nd, with the officers of the Peninsula present. This meeting was addressed by E. W. Wade, Toronto; D. Hunter, Grimsby, and Mr. Friel, Erie County Agent, New York State.

The main points brought out at this meeting were that each county should go ahead and complete definite plans and complete definite plans and include general organizations to carry out the work by April 15th and the canvass for each county should be completed on or before May 1st. If this is accomplished and the results sent to Toronto, there is a possibility that the testing will be done this summer. Otherwise the Niagara Peninsula will have to wait possibly two or three years. Mr. J. W. Richardson acted as chairman of this meeting and Mr. Ross Martindale as secretary.
