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Fourth Session of the County Council

MINUTES OF MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY, APRIL 16 - FIRST DAY

Council met pursuant to adjournment with all the members present; the Warden in the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

The following communications were then read.

1. Canada Dept. of the Secretary of State re conservation of the timber resources of Canada.

2. Dept. of Highways enclosing a statement showing Government subsidy of \$40,673.39 on expenditure of county roads in 1927 will be forwarded to the County Treasurer.

3. Hon. Geo. S. Henry acknowledging receipt of resolution re commencing limit of load of trucks in favorable weather conditions.

4. R. F. Miller M.L.A. acknowledging letter removing patients from Asylums to House of Refuge.

5. Mountain Sanitarium that Hasse Irene Laws has been admitted.

6. Haldimand War Memorial Hospital re Mrs. Isaac Smith.

7. S. E. Lindsay re sale of half acre by Janet Cranston to County.

8. The Travellers Insurance Co., re inspection of boilers at Court House and House of Refuge.

9. Clerk of Wentworth County re reduction of percentage to be paid by counties towards Provincial Highways.

10. Assessor Cayuga that Judge's residence is assessed for \$4500 and flats \$200.

11. Mothers Allowance Commission of Ontario with list of beneficiaries.

Hyslop-Colter—That the members of this Council have learned with a deep regret of the very sudden death, last week, of a former member of this Council in the person of John T. Peacock, who represented the township of Seneca as Reeve during the year 1915. The deceased was a man of fine natural ability, and a faithful and honest representative.

Resolved, that this resolution be inscribed in the minutes and a copy thereof forwarded by the Clerk to the widow of the deceased as an expression of the sincere sympathy of the members with her and her family in their time of bereavement. Cd. Aldridge-Honsberger.

That the auditors report for the first quarter be accepted. Carried.

Adjournment was made until 1:30. Business was resumed with the Warden in the Chair.

A bylaw, moved by Mr. Saunders and seconded by Mr. Aldridge, authorizing the Warden and Clerk to execute a contract with L. R. Gilmore to supply 7000 cubic yards of stone at \$2 per ton and authorizing the Warden and Clerk to execute a contract with Alfred Best to supply and deliver 12,000 cubic yards of stone at \$2.25 per yard and authorizing the sale of a crusher and equipment to Alfred Best for \$1800, \$900 payable on the 1st of October next and \$900 payable on the 1st of October, 1929, without interest, was given the three readings, signed, sealed and numbered and carried.

A bylaw, moved by Mr. Sherk and seconded by Mr. Locke, to appropriate \$10,000 for construction and \$90,000 for maintenance to be spent on the county roads during the year of 1928, was given its three readings, signed, sealed and numbered and carried.

Mrs. McDonauld—That we make a grant of \$200 to the Niagara District Committee "Ross Martindale, Secretary," to assist them in making their campaign and take the vote as to whether Haldimand County Cattle Feeders are in favor of a restricted load or not. Carried.

Miller-McDonald—That the bylaw amending the fees of our County Auditor be amended by making the fee per annum \$150 in place of \$75 as previously. Carried.

Miller-McDonald—That the County Auditor together with the Finance Committee meet as soon as possible to ascertain and submit to this Council at the next regular meeting a report as to the present liability of this County. Carried.

Adjournment was made to allow different committees to meet.
