A by-law was passed extending the
County Highway System by assuming
the following roads:

1. In the Township of Seneca—
Commencing at the Easterly limit of
the Hamilton and Port Dover Road,
Provincial Highway No. 5, at the road
between lots Seven and Eight, East
of the Hamilton and Port Dover road;
thence East and North and East past
Barrrows School House and Petch's
School House to the Stoney Creek
Road; thence Northerly along the
Stoney Creek Road to the Town Line
between Haldimand and Wentworth—
about 7 miles.

2. In the Township of Moulton—
Commencing at Provincial Highway
No. 3 at Franconia; thence 3 miles
southerly to the Canal Feeder; thence
along the Northerly side of said Feeder
2 mile east to the bridge over the
said Feeder; thence southerly to the
Lake Shore Road at Lowbanks 2 miles
—total 6 miles.

3. In the Township of South Cay-
uga and Dunn—Commencing at the
County Road No. 12 at Upper; thence
Easterly about 3 miles to the Town
Line between the Townships of Dunn
and the Township of South Cayuga;
thence south 3/4 of a mile to next
road; thence East to River Road and
thence along River Road to County
Road at Byng—about 7 1/2 miles.

4. In the Township of North Cay-
uga and Canboro—Commencing at the
Southerly limit of the Town of Cay-
uga; thence southeasterly along River
Road to Provincial Highway 3 west
of Dunnville—about 12 miles. Car-
ried.

A by-law was passed by which the
County of Haldimand assumes the
bridge across the Grand River at the
Village of York.

**GOOD ROADS COMMITTEE
REPORT**

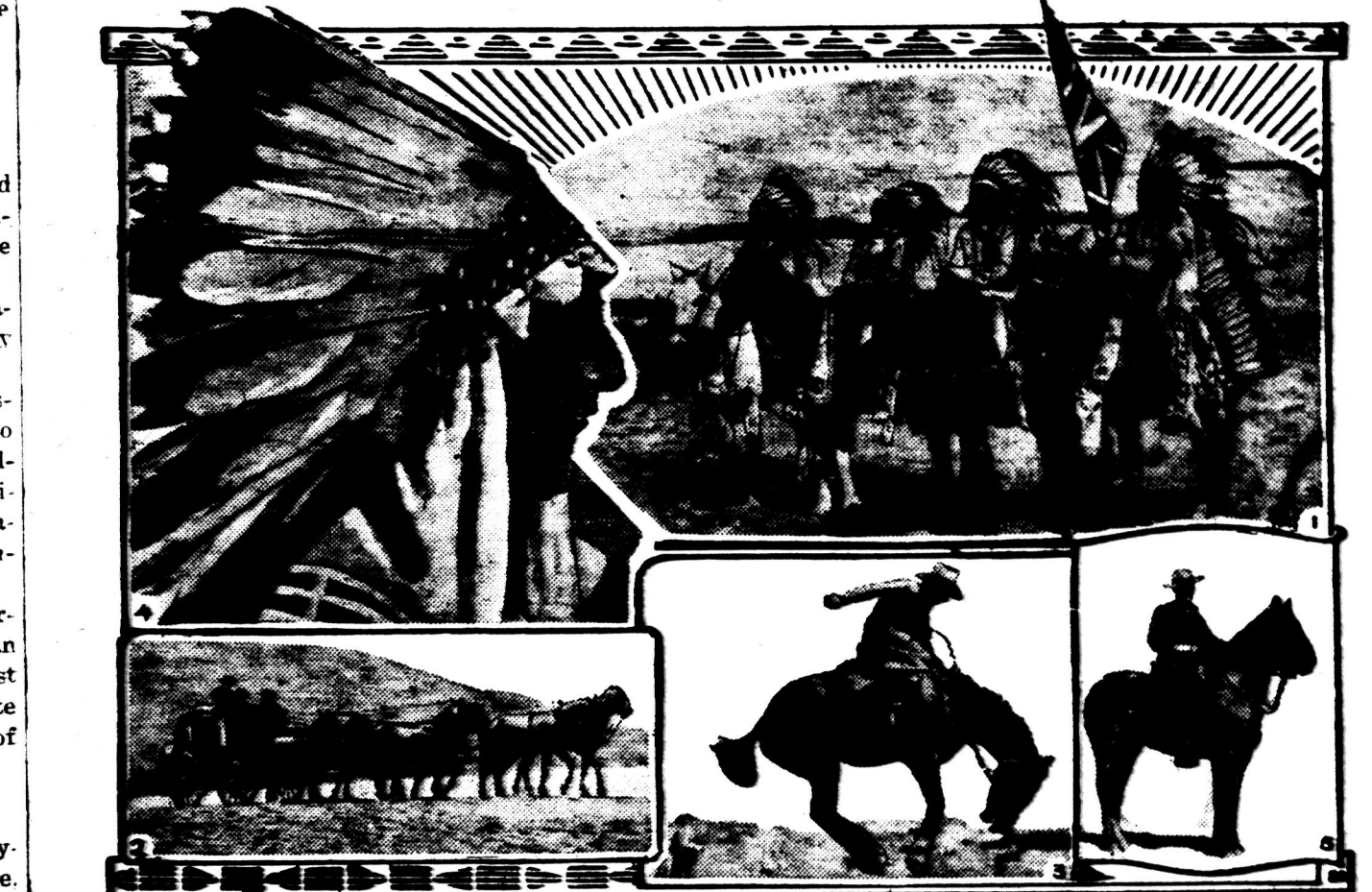
KEEPING ABREAST OF THE TIMES

A two day lead over ordinary Express Service between Rimouski and the west is now gained through the use by the Canadian Pacific Railway, of an air mail and Express package service between the Gulf Point and Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto. Parcels taken off incoming ships at Rimouski early Saturday reach Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto by plane the same day and, being carried from the latter point on the Vancouver Express arrive in Winnipeg on Monday morning and Vancouver Wednesday evening.
