WESLEY UNITED HOLDS A MOST UNIQUE SERVICE

Last Sunday morning's service in Wesley United church was one that will linger long in the memory of those who were privileged to attend. It was the first communion service since their minister, Rev. P. E. Deeth, came to Jarvis. The Garnet congregation came in large numbers and the church was taxed to its limit.

Rev. R. M. Dickey, ex-president of the Hamilton Conference, was the special preacher for the morning service. He based his sermon on the 8th verse of the 13th chapter of Hebrews: "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today and forever." The speaker pointed out that "Jesus Christ was the changeless Saviour for a changing world."

After the sermon a most impressive reception service was held, when Mr. Dickey, representing the President of the Hamilton Conference of the United Church of Canada, received into membership almost one hundred new members.

The communion service that followed the reception of these members was conducted by Rev. Mr. Dickey, assisted by the minister. It was a most impressive and beautiful service, over 300 persons partaking of the communion.

Miss Myrtle Hare, of Toronto, assisted the choir in the service of song and she delighted the large audience with her rendering of "Let Not Your Heart Be Troubled," and a Russian Legend by Teikavovsky. These solos were very much appreciated and were exceedingly appropriate for the occasion.

At the evening hour of worship the minister conducted the service, speaking on the subject: "Seeking the Truth." A splendid congregation was present at this service.
