## E. Vierkoetter at Erie Beach

One of the greatest aquatic events ever staged in this section of the country is scheduled for the Erie Beach Pool on Saturday and Sunday, August 18th and 19th when Ernst Vierkoetter, German swim star will appear in special exhibitions in the mammoth tank on the Canadian shore.

Vierkoetter long has been one of the greatest swimmers in the world, but he was given real recognition last September when he captured the second Wrigley Marathon staged at the Toronto Exhibition and won a purse of \$30,000 and the title of world's champion professional swimmer. The German Star covered the treacherous course of 21 miles in water lower than 60 degrees which is in itself definite proof of his ability as a real swimmer and in view of the fact that close to 200 swimmers started in the race including such stars as George Young winner of the Catalina Island Swim, Erickson the Swede, Keating the Lake George Swim winner and dozens of others the victory was most unusual. Vierkoetter swam a most heady race and won all by himself with second place going to Michel of France.

An idea of the greatness of the Erie Beach Attraction for next week-end lies in the fact that his date here was one of the very few he would accept before this year's Wrigley Race, which is scheduled for September 5th over a 15 mile course at the Canadian National Exhibition for a \$25,000 purse. Vierkoetter is training daily in Toronto and looks in fine fettle to repeat his sensational win of last season. Before turning professional, Vierkoetter was an amateur star and has raced many of the world's fastest swimmers. It took such a great star as Arne Borg winner of this year's 1500 meter Olympic championship at Amsterdam to defeat Vierkoetter at the European Championships held at Gothenburg in 1926 and the German was only one meter behind in the 500 meter race and to the swimming world held eight German championships in 1926 among them tank, outdoor, salt water and stream swimming titles. He has been coached by Erich Barensee of the Cologne Swimming Club for the past eight years and the coach will accompany him to Erie Beach for the exhibitions. Vierkoetter holds the world's record for swimming the English Channel which he accomplished in 1926 covering the difficult waters from Dover to Calais in 12 hours and 35 minutes. He plans to make a round trip of the English Channel in 1929 and hopes to cover the distance in between 23 and 24 hours. The

exact program for the German Bacter's appearance here will be announced in a few days.

Buffalo with a tremendous population of German people is expected to turn out by the thousands to pay tribute to the world's greatest swimming star and in all probability more than ten thousand people will turn out each day to see the champion work.
