## Haldimand County Council Donates a Scholarship

FOR O. A. C. STUDENT FROM THE COUNTY OF HALDIMAND—ONLY ONE TO BE AWARDED THIS YEAR.

The total value of the scholarship is \$100; \$50 is paid by the Haldimand County Council and \$50 from the Massey fund at the O.A.C.

The scholarship is to be granted to a student entering the 2-year course, the first year only.

Only one scholarship will be awarded in Haldimand County this year.

The scholarship is to be paid in two installments—one at the opening of the Fall Term and the other at the opening of the Winter Term.

The scholarship is to be available to any boy who complies with the terms of admission to the O.A.C. and who has attended either a short course under the Ontario Department of Agriculture or who has taken Agriculture at a High School.

Any young man in Haldimand who wishes to attend the O.A.C. and avail himself of this scholarship should mail in name and address to the Agricultural Office, Cayuga, on or before Wednesday, August 29th.

The final selection of the candidate to whom the scholarship will be awarded is to be made by a special committee selected for that purpose.
