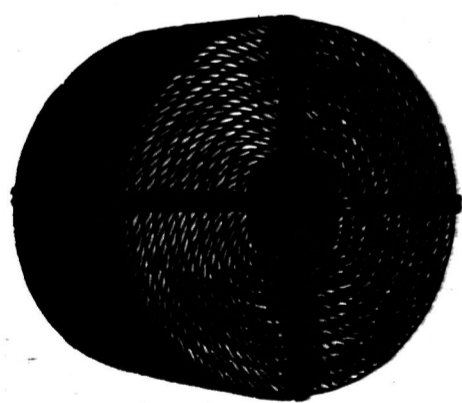

PT. DOVER MERCHANTS REPORT THE BUSINESS

This is a big year for Port Dover and the auto parties attached to town seem to outdo all previous records in this connection. This is particularly the case every Sunday, and the magnitude of the auto traffic may best be judged by the short delay caused when the bascule bridge was raised about 4 p.m. on Sunday last. In the short space of twelve minutes fifty-nine cars were lined up, which means that cars are pouring into the lakeside town from this direction alone at the rate of nearly three hundred per hour. On the Simcoe-Dover highway the traffic is even heavier, and it is safe to assume that on Sundays and holidays the crowd is pouring in at the rate of eight or nine hundred cars per hour from 10 a.m. on. One Sunday in July 457 cars (by actual count) passed down Main street, the count being taken at the corner of Main and McNab streets. It is, without doubt, the best season Port Dover has enjoyed in many years, and this increased success is due, in a large measure to the publicity given by the Nicholson Erie-Dover Ferry Line.

Increased Business on Ferry

From official returns it is learned that the ferry service is being well patronized this season. Up to the present the total number of cars brought into Port Dover via the ferry service exceeds last year's figure by nearly 1300, while the number of passengers carried is also greatly increased. By the end of this week the number of cars carried this year will be equal to the total number of cars for the entire 1927 season, and the officials of the company look for a still greater patronage during the weeks of the Toronto Exhibition. The hotels and boarding houses have been reporting "full house" for several weeks, and a continuance of the hot weather will spell more and more business for the lakeside town.

Summer Garden Attractions

The Summer Garden reports a slight falling off of patronage on certain nights of the week, but Mr. Ivey is making a big bid to build up these special nights with a series of special attractions, and on Friday night of last week a fancy dress carnival was the big attraction. There

was a fair crowd, and it was a merry crowd too.

SHOPLIFTERS CAUGHT IN PORT DOVER

On Sunday last a couple of summer visitors were caught in the act of shoplifting at the Reynolds' Drug Store. Mr. 'Jim' Hanley, who is in charge of the store, happened to return from the basement at the unexpected moment and just in time to see a \$8.00 bottle of perfume and a \$2.50 compact vanish. He charged his would-be 15c customers with the theft, which they absolutely denied. Mr. Hanley followed them and ascertained where they were staying, and notified Constable Ferris and Provincial Constable Wood, but before the latter had a chance to pay them an official visit the offenders saw the error of their ways, realized they were cornered and decided to make good before they paid a visit to the cooler. With the goods returned, the matter was allowed to drop, but not before some real good advice had been handed to the shoplifting couple.

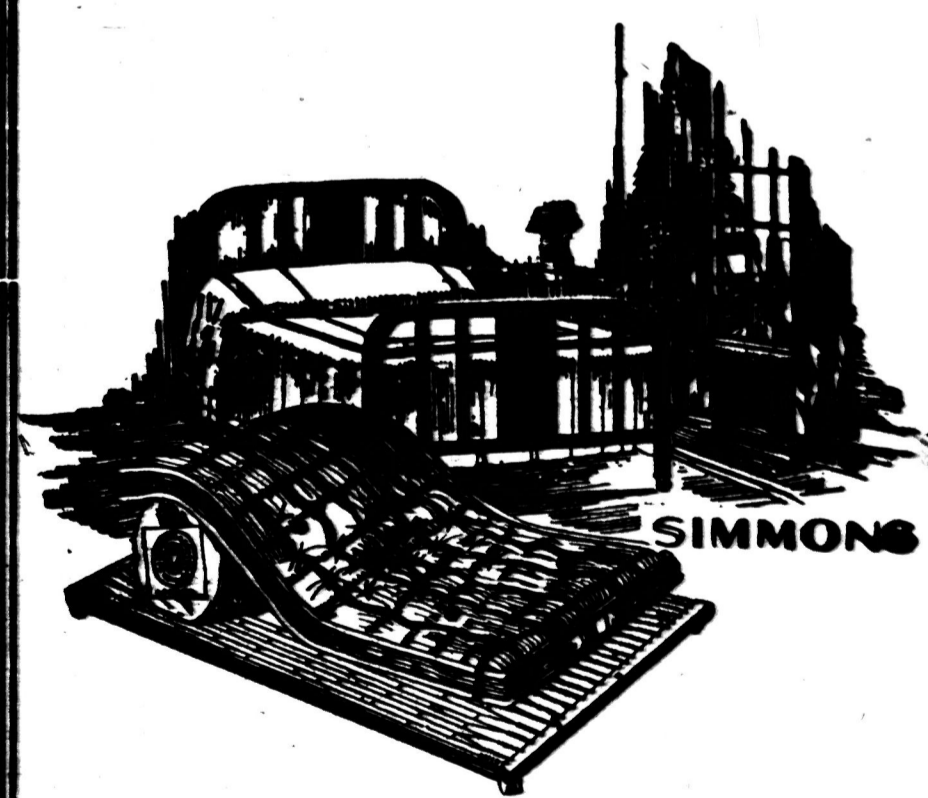
