## ACCEPTS NEW POSITION

Mr. C. C. Main, who for nearly the past five years has been District Representative for the Department of Agriculture, has been officially appointed District Representative of the Manufacturers Life Insurance Company for Haldimand County. Mr. Main assumed his new duties December 1st.

## MINISTER CALLED IS A NATIVE OF WALES

Rev. G. Lloyd Evans, of Rodney, who has been called to the Jarvis and Walpole Presbyterian churches, is a native of Wales and was a prominent minister there before coming to Canada in 1925 at the time of church union. Mr. Evans was born at Barmouth, a beautiful seaside resort in North Wales, and began to preach when he was 14 years of age.

He was educated, after leaving the day school at Barmouth, at Pontypridd academy, Glamorganshire, So. Wales, and at Owens college, Manchester, Eng.; and graduated from the Victoria university. He was ordained at Holywell, Flintshire, North Wales, a Welsh church. From there he moved to undertake the pastorate of one of the largest Welsh churches in Glamorganshire, Bethany Cwmavert, Port Talbot, and remained there 13 years. From there he received a call to an English church in Gloucester, and at the end of three years accepted an invitation to a church in Colchester. From there he came over to Canada in 1925 and received a call to his present pastorate at Rodney and New Glasgow. He went there over three years ago and now has a large congregation and one of the largest Bible classes in Canada. Every other organization connected with the church is in a healthy condition.

## A. G. SKINNER APPOINTED NEW REPRESENTATIVE

A. G. Skinner, newly appointed representative for Haldimand county, arrived in Cayuga on Friday last and assumed the duties of his office the following day.

After graduating from the O.A.C. at Guelph in 1924, Mr. Skinner filled a position in Grey county for seven months. He was then appointed as assistant representative and assistant superintendent of the Ontario government's demonstration farm in Temiskaming at New Liskeard, which position he held until just previous to being appointed at Cayuga.

### DR. MARSH INFORMS RECORD

The Sun storms just now are tremendous, covering over 2,000,000,000 square miles of the solar surface.

These storms are very close to the solar equator and about central on the solar surface. Tuesday and Wednesday. These storms will likely effect terrestrial conditions, especially southern locations.

### WORK ON MAUSOLEUM SHOWS GOOD PROGRESS

Noticeable progress is being made on the construction work of the Port Dover Community Mausoleum, in spite of somewhat adverse weather conditions and unavoidable delay in delivery of materials.

During the last ten days another large shipment of stone has arrived and been placed in position, bring the walls up to roof height all around the building.

The final shipment containing the tanks for that part of the chapel which extends above the height of the rest of the edifice is expected to arrive any day. This will enable the workmen to complete the stone work in a few days. The heavy derrick and other construction equipment can then be removed and this will permit the work of grading and leveling of the ground around the building to be finished this fall, leaving everything in readiness for the landscape gardener in the spring.

To the passer-by, perhaps, the most striking step in recent construction is the completion of the imposing entrance portico. Four Doric columns, each turned from a single stone and weighing 12,000 lbs. each, support the structure and do a great deal to heighten the impression of strength and great durability that emanates from the entire building.

Over the lintel runs a Latin inscription carved in the severe simplicity of the old Roman letters "SIC TRANSIT GLORIA MUNDI" (So passes away the glory of this world).

When we remember that every one of these blocks of stone has to be quarried out of the solid rock at Queenston and sawn to the exact shape and specifications for its own individual position in the wall according to the plan of the master builder, we can well realize that such work must of necessity be comparatively slow. The builders are to be congratulated on the phenomenal progress they have made in one short season.

Since the completion of the roof, work inside goes on steadily. The decorative ceilings in both corridors have been finished, as well as the band moulding on the massive beams.

Workmen are putting the finishing touches on the chapel ceiling and in a few more days the scaffolding can be removed.

The furnace has been installed and is in continuous operation, so that visitors, who are always welcome, will find it quite comfortable even when the temperature outdoors is uninviting. The doors are always open during daylight hours, enabling any one to make a leisurely inspection, which cannot but prove both interesting and instructive.

### BURGLARS VISIT THREE STORES IN CAYUGA

Burglars visited Cayuga some time during Thursday night or early on Friday morning last and entered three stores. The business places of D. H. Foster and E. B. Hodgkins were entered by breaking the glass in the door and opening the locks.

At G. W. Foss's store the door was burst open.

Mr. Foster's loss in goods, chiefly suits and overcoats, would amount to about \$500, besides loose change in the till to the amount of \$5. This loss is covered by burglary insurance.

Mr. Moss lost 15 men's suits, a fur coat and small articles, amounting in value to \$750. Mr. Hodgkins lost \$17 in cash and \$110 in goods.

L. Arrell, K.C., crown attorney and the provincial police department were immediately notified, but so far no trace of the burglars has been found.

Join the wheat pool and reap all you sow. The Ontario Wheat Pool is not a gold mine, or a mine turning out streams of gold to its members.

Rather, it is a compact, well ordered farms company, co-operative with a clear objective and following a well defined path. Its objectives are: 1st, getting as fair an average price as can possibly be secured for farmers' wheat; 2nd, eliminating the opportunity of its members being exploited by middle men; 3rd, providing the handling service at cost. In other words, securing for the members all the money his or her wheat will bring in the market from farmers granaries to the consumers. The pool member gets all his wheat will bring and reaps all he sows.

There is no winter wheat for export this year, so Ontario mills shall grind the year's crop and the farmers shall get bran and shorts from their own wheat. On the whole the members of the grain trade throughout the 16 counties in which the pool is organized show a reasonable spirit of co-operation. They want the business of pool members because it is profitable to them and many of them admit frankly that the development of the pool has brought bigger returns to growers than they have got under the old system of marketing, so why not join the wheat pool and reap all you sow.
