**HEALTH HINTS**  
By Mrs. C. Erwin

**THE PULSE**  
In all fevers an adult pulse of  
more than 120 is serious and indi-  
cates heart weakness. In certain  
diseases of the heart the pulse may  
be 120 or more without indicating  
extreme danger. In taking the pulse  
you are to gain a knowledge of the  
pulse to be counted in a minute such  
as normal, frequent, rapid and slow.

When the pulse beats from 105 to  
115 a minute it is said to be fre-  
quent. Above 115 is a rapid pulse.  
A slow pulse is below 70 beats a  
minute. A pulse may run upward as  
frequent or rapid by fevers, debility,  
excitement, stimulants or hysteria.  
Due to excitement it will only last  
while the excitement continues. A  
slow pulse is generally found in old  
age, after child birth, in convales-  
cence of several diseases, or chronic  
digestive disorders may cause a slow  
pulse.

Pulse characteristics to be recogniz-  
ed by:  
1. Force of strength, as strong or  
weak.  
2. Volume of size, as full or small.  
3. Tension or resistance, as hard  
or soft.  
4. Rhythm, as regular, irregular or  
intermittent.

In some patients the pulse is so  
feeble that very slight pressure is  
sufficient to obliterate it, in which  
case it is said to be very compress-  
ible. Volume of the pulse means its  
size. When the beat of the heart is  
large, it is known as full pulse;  
whereas, if the beat is light (lack  
vigor) and easily compressed, it is  
known as a small pulse. A full pulse,  
as fullness of the blood vessels in a  
robust person, (of fevers). A small  
pulse is found in debility or exhaust-  
ion.

The Tension of the pulse express-  
es the degree of distention of the  
arteries and may be either hard or  
soft. If the artery seems to remain  
full between the beats, the pulse is  
said to be hard or of high tension.  
Its opposite is a soft pulse of low  
tension (or a pulse of low tension).
