## Walter Croft and Wm. Rozel Convicted by Jury

CAYUGA, Dec. 11.—In his charge to the grand jury at the county court here today, Judge Hopkins, who presided, called special attention to the number of motor accidents taking place every day and prevalence of perjury. He also deplored the sentiment which existed regarding criminals guilty of burglary while armed.

The court opened at 1 o'clock with two criminal cases listed, in both of which the grand jury brought in true bills. In Rex versus Walter Croft the charge was criminal negligence by which Moses Furlong was killed on the night of July 5th. The deceased was struck while walking toward Cheapside by a car driven by Croft. Charged 17 years. It was proved that the lights of the car were defective and only a spotlight was showing.

Robert Gilmore, who was in the car with Croft, testified that they were traveling from 10 to 15 miles an hour, when he saw a shadow on the road. Croft swerved and then struck.

The boys were frightened and did not stop. The injured man was found about 11 p.m. by L. B. Gilmore, of Hamilton, who took him to the home of Wm. Webb, with whom he lived, and where he died about three hours after being struck.

Dr. E. M. Jones, of Jarvis, testified that death was caused by shock and hemorrhage of the brain.

Several witnesses testified to the good character of Croft. After being out for an hour and a half the jury brought in a verdict of guilty.

The second case, Rex versus Wm. Rozel, was a charge of shooting with intent to do bodily harm to Jno. Harnett. The shooting took place on the evening of November 3rd in front of Harnett's home in Canboro Township. The accused, who is a deaf mute, signed a declaration to the effect that he had shot Harnett because he feared he would kill his housekeeper, Mrs. Mc Bateman. Mrs. Bateman testified that he and Harnett had an argument on the night in question, and that he threw an iron on the floor Rozel, who worked for Harnett, had gone to the barn and returned with a shotgun and shot Harnett as he left the house. He was wounded in the jaw, side of the neck and shoulder. He was taken to Dunnville hospital, where he remained for a week, but was able to be present at the trial and give evidence.

After being out about two hours the jury brought in a verdict of guilty with recommendation to mercy.

Crown Attorney Harrison Arrett, K.C. conducted the case, and both of the accused were defended by R. S. Colter, K.C., and H. A. Colter. Col. Massie occupied a seat on the bench with Judge Hopkins.—Free Press.
