

South Pole Flight by Wilkins's Party Told by Wireless

Message to Pilot's Father Reports Success in the Antarctic

New York.—Radio messages sent from the antarctic by Capt. Sir Hubert Wilkins told of the first air-flight made over that region.

One message, addressed to Ole Eleison of Hatton, N.D., father of Lieut. Ben Eleison, pilot of the expedition, read:

"Ben made first antarctic flight to-day. Regards, Wilkins."

A second message was received by the Wright Aeronautical Corporation. The Wilkins expedition, the object of which is to study weather conditions and locate suitable places in the antarctic for meteorological stations, was bound for Deception Island, a desert of land 60 miles off the coast of Graham Land, due south of Cape Horn, the southern extremity of South America.

From a base either on Graham Land or Deception Island they hoped to make flights of exploration east along Graham Land and west to the Ross Sea. The latter flights would carry expedition. The messages from Wilkins were sent via Port Stanley in the Falkland Islands.

In addition to Wilkins and Eleison, other members of the expedition are Joe Crosson, assistant pilot, William Gaston and Orval Porter, mechanics.

Self-Expression

Statesmen and political leaders live in a world which is full of awkward obstacles in the way of accepting words to mean what they say. British Engineer Crosses Danakil in Abyssinia

Passage of Upper and Lower Regions Said to be First Done by Europeans

London.—An account of what is claimed to be the first crossing by Europeans of the Upper and Lower Danakil of Abyssinia is published in The Times. The journey was accomplished by L. M. Nesbitt, a British mining engineer, accompanied by two Italian traders, T. Pastori and G. Rosina, with a caravan of 15 natives, 25 camels and 4 mules.

The party started from Hawassa Bridge station on the Jibuti-Addis Abeba Railway, on March 13, zig-zagged along the course of the Hawassa River to the Sultanate of Aussa, where they were met by an escort from the Sultan, who, after a period of mistrust, gave the travelers safe conduct to the borders of his dominions.

Thence they marched north to the Biru Sultanate, where water holes are four or even six days apart and the heat is extreme owing to the greater part of the land being several hundred feet below sea level.

Ultimately they arrived at Assale-Dolol, on the borders of the Italian colony of Eritrea, reaching the coast village of Mersa Fatima a few days later on July 1.

Mr. Nesbitt is expected to lecture before the Royal Geographical Society at an early date.



Norway Wins Fight to Get Blue Whales

\$2,500,000 Research Expedition Financed by British Goes for Naught—But Sad Part is Extirmination of Sea Monsters

London.—Norway has apparently beaten England in a fight for the \$2,500,000 whale-oil industry in the antarctic; and British disappointment over this defeat is so keen that the question will probably be raised in Parliament during the present session.

The public knows and cares little about a business rivalry so far from home, but the business interests involved are resentful. Their disappointment is all the sharper because \$2,500,000 has been spent in trying to establish a profitable industry for England in the antarctic. An elaborately equipped research expedition, for example, was sent to the south aboard the ship Discovery to investigate the whale and its habits. The Discovery returned with a mass of scientific information, yet the expedition must be called a failure from the British business point of view.

Only two British companies are now operating in the antarctic, as compared with thirteen energetic Norwegian companies there. More than 10,000 whales are killed each year and the value of whale oil produced annually has risen to more than \$30,000,000. The Norwegians, using floating whale-oil "factories" built in England, have pushed ahead until they have almost a monopoly of the industry.

Still more discouraging to those watching the situation here is the gradual extermination of the great blue whale which American whalers once killed in small numbers but which the Norwegians are now killing by thousands. Licenses for whaling were once issued for small British stations on the shores of the Falkland Islands; but the Norwegians have made licenses unnecessary by their floating whaling stations, which are utterly unregulated. The great antarctic blue whale, which grows to 100 feet in length, multiplies slowly, and thus there is grave danger that the species will some day become extinct.

If the British oil interest had their way they would acquire the Norwegian whaling stations with encouragement from the Colonial Office here, and would then press for international regulations to govern the whaling trade. Only in this way, it is argued here, will it be possible for British interests to reap the benefits of expeditions like the Discovery's and make England once more a factor in the only industry of importance in the antarctic.

Many New Flying Clubs Are Formed

Eight Applications Now Being Considered by Defence Department

Ottawa.—Eight applications for new flying clubs are being considered by the Department of National Defence. Sixteen clubs have been formed throughout the Dominion since May 1. The first club was formed in Toronto early in that month, and the last license was granted to the Calgary club on Sept. 8.

There are 2,227 members in the various clubs according to a report issued at the civil aviation branch. Since Sept. 30, 130 new members have joined.

Two planes have been granted each organization by the Government free of charge in order to stimulate interest in aviation. An average of 350 flying hours for each club to date is indicated in the report.

As a result of the clubs' activities 63 private pilot licenses and 21 commercial pilot licenses have been granted. Seventeen licenses for private pilots have been granted since September.

Clubs are at present in operation at the following points: Halifax, Granby (P.Q.), Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Hamilton, London, Walkerville (Ont.), Winnipeg, Regina, Moose Jaw, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, Victoria and Vancouver.

Applications for licenses have been received from clubs at the following places: Brantford, Ont., Glace Bay, N.S., Fort William, Kingston, Peterborough, Ont., St. John, N.B., St. Catharines, Ont., and Brockville, Ont.

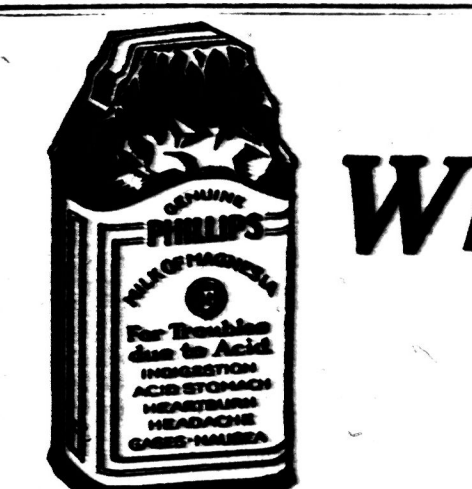


