PASS A RESOLUTION OF COMMENDATION

While the members of the Walpole Council invite and expect honest criticism and receive many communications to that effect, they are led to sometimes forget that their efforts are appreciated by anybody, and when they received at their last meeting the following resolution passed by the True Canadian Club at Nanticoke, they felt that their efforts had not been in vain and it was an inspiration to know the people feel that the council is trying to serve them as fairly and well as they know how to do.

RESOLUTION

It is extremely regrettable that all public men are subjected to criticism from the people who do not fully serve. Criticism of a public man discourages the participation of broad-minded men in public life and smothers the tax-payers' interest in municipal government.

The council of the municipality of Walpole has made an honest endeavor to build a large mileage of stone road at the least possible cost to the people. A portion of contributions were subscribed by private individuals.

Whereas there has been considerable condemnation of the council re the building of two sections of road in the south-west part of the township

Whereas the landowners in this township are paying large sums towards the upkeep of roads which they are only able to use part of the year

Whereas there is considerable expense in grading and upkeep of dirt roads; this money being wasted as these roads never improve and are never suitable for traffic in wet seasons,

Be it therefore resolved, that the building of stone roads on concessions where \$500 per mile is contributed from private sources is in the best interests of the municipality and that this organization endorses the procedure of the men of the council and wish to commend them for the splendid mileage of new roads laid down during the year of 1928.

This resolution, prepared and read by Carroll Lindsay and seconded by Russell Hare, was passed by the True Canadian club at Nanticoke, Friday evening, December 14th, without a dissenting voice or vote.

DR. AND MRS. MARSH TAKE THEIR AUDIENCE TO THE SUNNY SOUTH

When the Rev. Dr. Marsh and Mrs. Marsh took their audience from Jarvis to South America on Monday evening, December 17th, their first stop, after leaving New York, was the far-famed sunny islands of Bermuda. Dr. Marsh spoke of these islands as Nature's "Love Spot," where the beauties of everywhere are gathered into here—Nature's rest and healing resort. He spoke of its flowers, its bathing beaches and its waters of blue, and kindly and lovingly spoke of its people of both races. He said he loved the spot and urged his audience to visit it. Then off he went in travelogue to the West Indies, where on arriving at Trinidad, Mrs. Marsh took the platform and conducted the charmed audience over Trinidad and to South America. She pictured graphically, with speech and photographs, the low-lying British Guianas, protected from the sea by 270 miles of sea-wall. She told the story of the country and people, and of the Presbyterian church missions. On her return trip she said some lovely things about dear old Bermuda.

This talk was much appreciated by all who heard. Mr. E. A. McCarter ably filled the chair for the evening.
