HEALTH HINTS By Mrs. C. Erwin

BODILY TEMPERATURE

The bodily temperature of the adult taken in the mouth is about 98. The temperature may vary from 97.5 to 99.5 within the limit of health.

A temperature below 97.5 is subnormal (below normal) and is a symptom of much importance. A temperature from 97 to 96 indicate collapse. A temperature below 95 shows a very serious condition.

A temperature subnormal the flesh is cold, clammy, eyes sunk back, patient complains of being cold. Use hot water bottle or hot iron to bring warmth. Give a warm drink as a cup of black coffee, hot tea.

A high temperature lessens the power of the organs to perform their functions. If the temperature be high and long continued, the functions may become seriously interfered with. The clinical thermometer, by giving us this temperature information, helps us to tell what the disease is likely to be. That is, it helps us to make a diagnosis. The feeling of heat obtained by the hand must never be relied on as a guide to the temperature of a patient. The thermometer must be the only guide.

The Clinical Thermometer

The large lines on the scale indicate degrees. The finer lines between them divide the degrees into fifths. The fractions of a degree are usually read as tenths.

Before taking the temperature always shake the column of mercury below 96, so there may be subnormal temperature that would otherwise pass unnoticed. To shake the mercury down, grasp the larger end of the thermometer securely in your hand, with the small part downward and give a full arm downward swing ending up with a jerk. Two or three swings generally puts the column in its position for use. The temperature should not be taken in the mouth immediately after a hot or cold drink, as the temperature of the mouth would be altered. A physician will tell you when and how often he wishes the temperature taken. Usually it is taken in the morning, noon and nights.
