Everyone took great interest in his speech as little is known by most people concerning this recently formed organization. Russell Hare's songs and readings were well received. Harvey Vokes then entertained the audience with two clever recitals. The elongated boxing bout which followed, furnished plenty of fun for all and proved to be the feature of the afternoon. She was formerly a student at the technical high school, and had been in training at the hospital since June. She was well known in the city and will be missed by a large circle of friends. Miss Jackson was born in McTaggart, Saskatchewan. She was a member of St. Barnabas church choir.

She is survived by her parents, four brothers (Charles, Jack, Norbert and Murray), and one sister, Muriel, all residing in New Westminster. Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Jackson of New Westminster are also relatives.—The Vancouver Sun.

## GLENNY IS WARDEN

Reeve Dan Glenny, of Canboro, was elected Warden of Haldimand County, at the inaugural meeting of the County Council on Tuesday afternoon, January 24th. Reeve Jas. Lockie, of N. Cayuga, was nominated but did not get the necessary majority. Reeve Glenny was elected on the second ballot.

## NEW RADIO STATION

It is officially announced that the new radio station CKGW, owned and operated by Gooderham & Worts, Ltd., Toronto, has been completed and will be on the air during the latter part of February.

This is Canada's first high-powered station and marks a notable forward step in the history of radio progress in the Dominion. The project was conceived and executed by Harvey C. Hatch, the well-known sportsman.

The transmitter and aerials are operated at G. & W. Park, Bowmanville, Ont., on a high bluff on the shore of Lake Ontario. A distinctive feature is the installation of crystal control, which has not yet been used by any other station in the Dominion and by only one or two of the new high-powered stations in the United States. This method is the latest means for economizing wave areas, enabling two or more stations to be synchronized, the crystals being so accurately matched that no audible heterodyne will result between stations so controlled.

Owing to the high power of the station, 5,000 watts, the programs of CKGW will probably be heard over a very wide range of territory, not only east and west, but in the remote regions of the Far North. It will also cover a large part of the thickly populated sections of the U. S., and will effectively put Canada on the radio map of the North American Continent.

## NEW MODEL 1928 HOG

When the 1928 model hog comes out it won't create as much of a sensation as the new Ford caused, but it will be equally important.

The keen-looking, underslung hog with lean pork chops and lean side bacon and hams that will test out 48 gravity pure—that's the hog for 1928.

## ARCHBISHOP OF HURON RE-OPENED CHURCH

The newly decorated All Saints' church at Mount Pleasant was recently re-opened by His Grace the Most Reverend David Williams, D.D., Archbishop of Huron. The service was of a most impressive character, His Grace preaching a fitting sermon from the 84th Psalm, verse 1, "O how amiable are thy dwellings, Thou Lord of Hosts," in which he stressed the vital relationship between the worship of the church and the three fundamental elements of society, the individual, the family and the nation.

The music for the service was well rendered by all Saints' choir under the direction of Mrs. W. H. Inglis. Miss Hilda Briggs rendered a solo, "The Good Shepherd," in splendid form. Jackson's Te Deum was sung as an anthem.

The interior of the church has been attractively yet conservatively decorated. The well known ecclesiastical symbols have been used effectively in the adornment of the chancel and the nave.

The paint, varnish and other materials for both the interior and exterior, the latter work to be done in the spring, was the gift of an old Mount Pleasant boy, John H. Whitlam, now residing in Wadsworth, Ohio, where he is the chief executive of the J. H. Whitlam Manufacturing company, makers of paints and varnishes, one of the leading concerns in this line in the United States.

The Whitlam family was among the old pioneers of Mount Pleasant and were devoted members of the All Saints' church. The passing of the years has not lessened John Whitlam's continued interest in All Saints'. His boyhood friends in Mount Pleasant are pleased that Mr. Whitlam's business career has been a most successful one.

All Saints' church, built 86 years ago by the pioneers, is one of the landmarks of Mount Pleasant. Sitting in a well kept cemetery, it has the atmosphere of the rural English church. The congregation has always taken a pride in its appearance and while the exterior is painted in the spring, the work of improvement will have been completed.—Brantford Expositor.
