It is often difficult to give a mean-

One of these words is "Health." We
say that we are healthy and yet,
when asked to explain what we mean,
we likely find it almost impossible to
put our meaning into words.

In the first place, when we are
healthy we are free from any obvious
disease. That perhaps is the com-
monest idea of health. As long as
an individual goes about his work and
does not complain, he is thought of
as healthy.

As a matter of fact, such people are
not necessarily healthy in anything
like the full meaning of the word.
Freedom from actual disease is de-
sirable, but health is far more than
that. Health is something positive,
something that brings happiness to
us. The person with health faces the
day's work with confidence, finds a
pleasure in his occupation, is able to
do better work, and can fully enjoy
the hours of relaxation.

It is surprising the number of people
who spend a more or less miser-
able life, unable to accomplish the
things of which they are capable be-
cause they have not health. These
same people are surprised when, on a
medical examination, they learn
that there is something wrong with
their bodies, something not perhaps
serious enough to cause death, but
sufficient to handicap them in their
daily life and, perhaps, to make them
grow prematurely old.

and yet are free from any physical
blemish. These are the people who
are not following the simple rules of
hygienic living. We cannot rob our
bodies of rest, fresh air or proper
food and continue to have health.

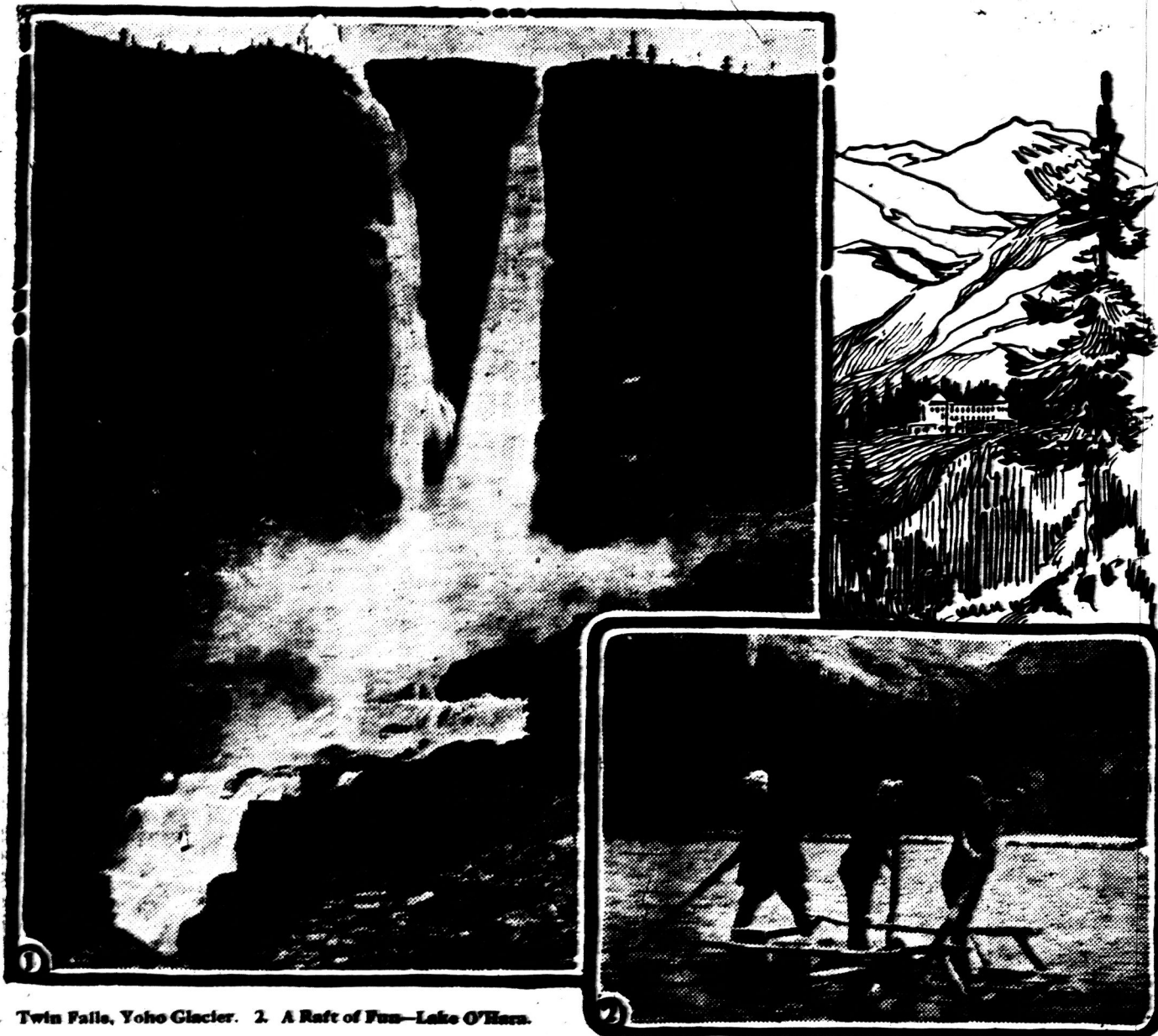

"Picturesque America" Includes Picturesque Canada

Can you imagine a span of a thousand million years
or so? If you can, try to picture to yourself the
place where the Rocky Mountains now stand, with
their snow-crowned peaks towering into the sky, at
the bottommost depths of an inland sea.

Do you know how the Rockies were formed? By
what Titanic forces these great masses were crumpled
and folded and lifted high in the air?

It is a most interesting story that geology tells us
concerning the formation of this gigantic range through
the ages—ages before the human race dwelt upon the
earth, and only one of the many other fascinating
things that one learns about one's own land, in "Pic-
turesque America," a de-luxe volume, superbly illus-
trated with 500 photographs and charmingly written,
which has been published recently by "The Resorts
and Playgrounds of America," New York.

It is a compliment, and not one undeserved, to Can-
ada, that this book, which describes so clearly and
well, the wonders and beauties of the parks and beauty
spots of North America, should give over more than
one-quarter of its space to Canada's great playground.
Yet it cannot but be recognized that her parks are
unique in their magnificence of form and beauty of

color, in their preservation of game and wild crea-
tures, and in their possession of great virginial forests
and vast regions as yet unexplored.

The National Parks of Canada are 14, in number and
range in area from a few square miles to 4,000 square
miles. For the most part they are found in the
western part of the country; while the three most
beautiful Rocky Mountain parks, Banff, Lake and
Glacier, lie along the main line of the Can. Pac. Pacific
Railway.

Many well-known writers, such as Robert Sterling
Yard, Zane Grey, Mary Roberts Rinehart, Henry Van
Dyke, Charles Lummis, Arthur Stringer, Mary Carolyn
Davies, and J. B. Harlan have contributed to this vol-
ume, which maintains a high standard of literary qual-
ity throughout. Verses of nature by equally well-
known poets are scattered throughout, and there is
added a complete index and bibliography. Hence be-
sides the charm of the book it is invaluable as one of
reference. It would seem that its purpose—to make
better known and thus better appreciated the scenic
marvels of America's wonderlands, must be accom-
plished.
