Rev. C. J. Lamb of Hagersville was appointed a trustee of the H. School Board of the Village of Hagersville for the years 1928, 1929 and 1930; and William Griffith of the town of Dunnville for the years 1928, 1929 and 1930.

A bylaw was introduced and passed fixing the salary of the gaoler of the County at \$1000 and the matron at \$200 per year payable monthly.

Council moved to adjourn to meet at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 25th.

### SECOND DAY

Miller-Saunders—Resolved that the Haldimand County Council do hereby desire to express to the Hon. John S. Martin, Minister of Agriculture, their entire approval of the Royal Judging Competition and the taking of 500 Jr. Farmers to the Royal Winter Fair as guests of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture. We heartily endorse this policy and recommend that it be continued. Carried.

The report of the Public School Inspector was adopted and ordered to be printed in the minutes as usual.

The auditors' quarterly report was adopted.

At his request Mr. Melick's name was stricken off the Home Committee.

The report of the Road and Bridge Committee was adopted as read.

The report of the Printing and Insurance Committee was read and adopted.

Mrs. Sawie's tender for the 1928 printing was accepted.

Messrs. Colter, Miller and Kern and the Clerk were appointed a committee to investigate the conditions at the House of Refuge.

The Warden and Clerk were authorized to sign and submit to the Minister of Public Works and Highways of Ontario the petition of the Corporation of the County of Haldimand showing that during the period January 1st, 1927, to December 31st, 1927, there has been expended upon County Highway System the sum of \$81,008.46, requesting the statutory grants on that amount provided by the Act to aid in improvement of Pub. Highways.

The report of the Building Committee was read and adopted.

The County Solicitor was instructed

to write to the Haldimand Advocate, demanding the name of the writer of the letter signed "Dry Lake, Ont." so that action may be taken against him.

The report of the Supply Committee was read and adopted.

A bylaw was introduced and adopted authorizing the County of Haldimand to borrow from the Canadian Bank of Commerce the sum of \$100,000 required to meet the new current expenditure.

Miller-Saunders—That bylaw No. 546 repealing bylaw No. 712 be amended by adding thereto the words:

"This bylaw to come into force immediately after the report of the Committee appointed to investigate conditions at the House of Refuge is adopted," and that the Corporate Seal of the County of Haldimand be attached to this resolution and that it have the force and effect of a bylaw.

Harcourt R. Kern-R. S. Colter—WHEREAS we the members of the Haldimand County Council have experienced and considered the large expenditure necessary for the construction and maintenance of Provincial Highways,

AND WHEREAS roads designed principally for interurban and tourist traffic are not suitable for teaming or traction engines necessary for farm purposes,

AND WHEREAS these roads limit to a standard of 30 feet or more with all new concrete culverts and bridges, deep wide ditches on each side with heavy stone base and tarvia penetration cost about \$20,000 per mile,

AND WHEREAS the treatment with an oil and stone dressing each year for about three years cost \$1,000 per mile,

AND WHEREAS a more permanent top requires concrete or asphalt which costs about \$24,000 per mile making a total cost of about \$50,000 per mile in five years,

AND WHEREAS the concrete and asphalt may carry the heavy overloaded trucks, our side streets and lightly constructed rural roads are subjected to an unlimited amount of destruction.

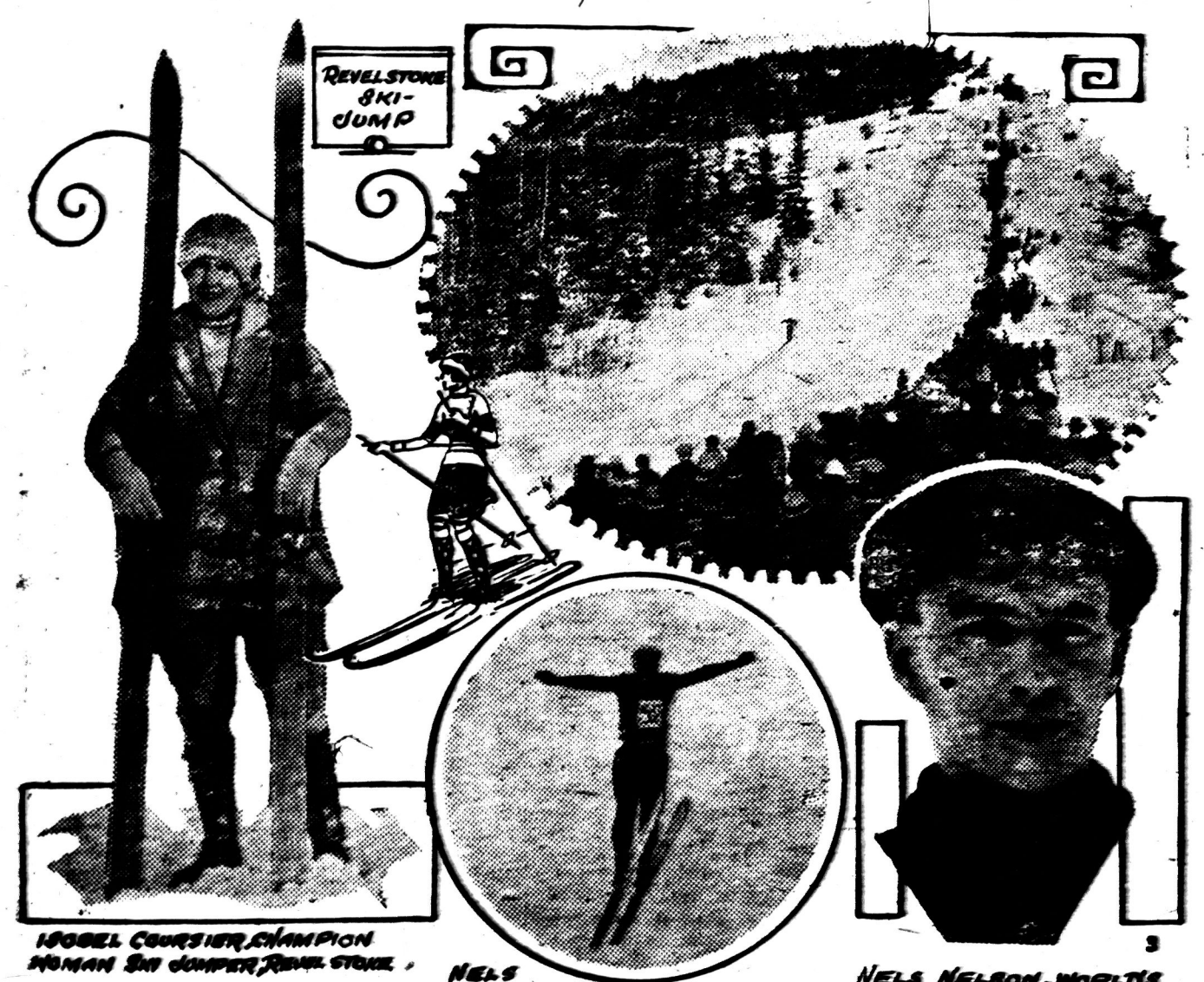

### Revelstoke, Queen City of the Ski-Jumpers

NELS NELSON IN FLIGHT

NELS NELSON, WORLD'S CHAMPION - 890 FT

The town of Revelstoke, nestled among the Selkirk Mountains in the broad valley of the Columbia river, in British Columbia, is noted for two things: its National Park, situated on top of Mount Revelstoke, and its world famous ski jump where world records have been made and up to the present date not surpassed.

The Revelstoke Winter Carnival extends from February 6-10 inclusive. During this celebration the fourteenth annual ski-jumping tournament takes place on February 7-8. The famous hill, where the jumps are made, has a total length of 1,780 feet, with a runway of 500 feet. The distance from the take off to the farthest point at which a safe landing is assured, is 230 feet, or 40 feet beyond the present world record.

Nels Nelson, a brakeman on the Canadian Pacific Railway, established his world record jump of 240 feet in 1925. The woman's record jump of 84 feet was also made on the Revelstoke ski hill in 1922, by Isobel Coursier, a record which still stands.

Little children in this mountain town who can do little more than walk begin to ski as soon as there is sufficient snow and they are brought up to think no more of skiing than the average child thinks of walking. The children have their own hill and little jumps from which they graduate one by one.

Revelstoke has an unusually large skating rink for the size of the town and there are four curling rinks. The dates for the Banff Winter Carnival are from February 4-11, making it
