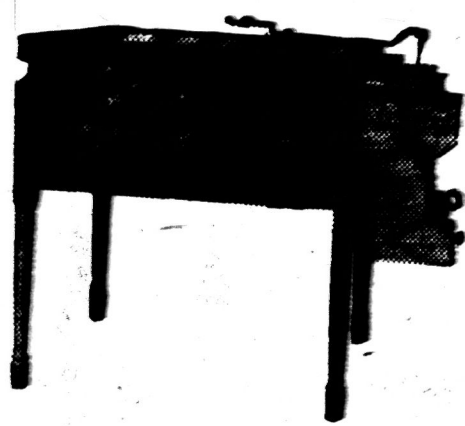

COUNTY COUNCIL

AND WHEREAS the only way the
County and local municipalities have
of raising money is by direct taxation
while the Dept. of Highways has the
money obtained from motor license
tax and has tax to which we all
pay our share travelling by automo-
bile or bus.

AND WHEREAS the Provincial Road
System is a benefit to the County,
we feel that we should pay a fair
share of the cost of maintenance and
construction.

AND WHEREAS the payment of 20%
is proving a severe handicap to our
County and Township system.

That we petition the Dept. of High-
ways to pay 50% of the cost of con-
struction and maintenance of Provin-
cial Highways and that the County
be asked to contribute only 10%.

And that a copy of this resolution
be forwarded to the Dept. of High-
ways, to the member of the Legisla-
ture, to the Legislation Committee of
the Good Roads Convention and to
the Clerk of each County Council in
Ontario. Carried.

At the request of Mr. Arrell, his

GOOD ROADS COMMITTEE

The pay-lists and accounts submit-
ted by the Superintendent were or-
dered paid. The Superintendent sub-
mitted his annual statement of ex-
penditures for the year ending Dec.
31st, 1927, amounting to \$31,608.65.

It was recommended that the whole
Council with the Clerk attend meeting
of Ontario Good Roads Ass'n held in
Toronto Feb. 22, 23 and 24.

HOME COMMITTEE

The report of the Home Committee
was read and adopted as follows:

Since the last meeting of the Com-
mittee there have been admitted to the
Home, Herbert Struder of Hagersville.

Wm. Pettifer of Seneca and Mrs.
Ann Mitchell of Moulton; making a
total of 38 inmates. 15 females and
23 males. The health of the inmates
is fair. Since our last meeting sev-
eral organizations have visited the
Home and provided the inmates with
various entertainments and treats
such as fruit, candies, tobacco, etc.

The following organizations' generos-
ity is greatly appreciated: Dunnville
Lions Club, the Grace United Church
Choir, St. Paul's Anglican Church and
Mission Circle of Grace United Church.

We have examined the accounts of
the Home and Children's Aid Society
and find them correct and recommend
them to the Finance Committee for
payment.
