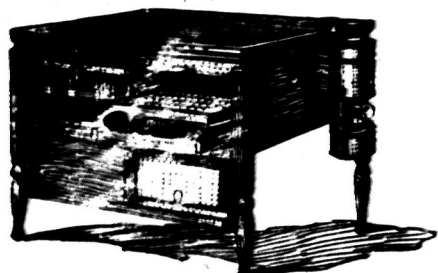

cliffe Stn., Caledonia, Caledonia, Cayuga, Dunnville, Hagersville, Jarvis and Selkirk centres. Of 220 candidates 266 received certificates or 83 per cent. of those writing. Candidates for Departmental Examinations for Teachers' Certificates and Matriculation wrote at the different High Schools.

VISITS

The changes in the regulations permitting the Inspector to pay more frequent visits to weak and inexperienced teachers if necessary and to help with school problems generally have materially helped in raising the standard of work of these teachers.

10,000,000 FOREST TREES FOR FREE DISTRIBUTION

We wish to draw the attention of our readers to the fact that the Ont. Government, through the Forestry Branch, has for distribution this year ten million forest trees. These are to be used for reforesting waste areas of the Province, and it is expected that at least three-quarters of them will be used by private individuals throughout Ontario for reforesting waste areas of the farm and for the planting of windbreaks. The Government scheme at present provides that any resident of the Province may secure 3,500 trees free for reforesting work and an additional 500 of spruce and cedar for windbreak planting. Application for trees should be made to the Ontario Forestry Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto.

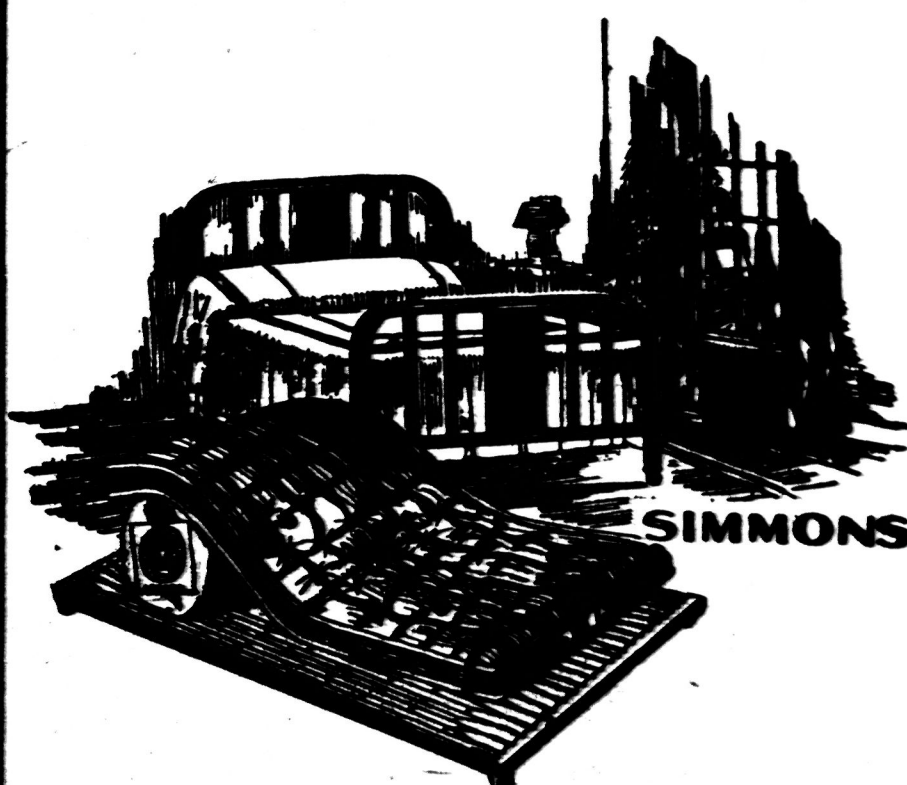
