REPORT OF THE TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF W. I. OF CENTRAL ONT.

Held in Hygeia Hall, Toronto, on November 15, 16 and 17 — Given by Mrs. Vokes, Delegate From the Nantawake Branch

I wish to thank the Women's Institute for nominating me as a delegate to this convention. When one hears so many splendid reports, telling us of the good work the Women's Institutes are doing, one cannot help being inspired by these reports and desire to do even better work in our own personal branches.

The meeting opened at 1:15 Tuesday afternoon with Mrs. T. W. Meek of Alton in the chair, who acted as chairman of the Convention Committee. From 1:15 to 1:30 there was registration of the delegates. From 1:30 to 2:00 there was community singing led by Mrs. G. A. M. Davison. After singing a number of community songs as The Maple Leaf, O Canada, Smile, and The Little Brown Church in the Vale, the meeting was officially opened by the singing of the Lord's Prayer, followed by the Lord's Prayer. Mrs. Meek asked if there was any person present this year at the convention that was present at the first convention held in Guelph a number of years ago. There was not any. Mrs. Smythe, President of the Provincial Council of Women, gave the address of Welcome. In her talk she stressed that we should learn teamwork and co-operation in our Institutes. She said our duties as a member of the W. I. are: 1, Co-operation; 2, To give and give of our best. The Institutes in helping the poor and the needy in the communities help to build the community spirit. The Women's Institutes are helping women to discover themselves—that is showing up different women's talents which may be the gift of housekeeping, the gift of humour, speech, etc., all of which we need in our branches. She also stated that it is our duty to find the talents that are dormant or otherwise, that lie in our branches and then develop accordingly. She mentioned that the duty of the Provincial Council of Women is to speak out for the inarticulate. In concluding her speech, Mrs. Smythe bid everyone welcome to the City of Toronto, to have a very successful and profitable convention. She brought warm and sisterly greetings to make our province the very finest place in the whole world in which to live and bring up our children.

Mrs. J. W. Stone, of Bond Head, then replied to Mrs. Smythe's address of welcome. She thanked Mrs. Smythe for her address and stated that speaking on behalf of the Women of Central Ontario, she could see the deepest gratitude on every face and that Mrs. Smythe had given the meeting the kindred spirit to make the convention a success. Mrs. Stone stated that there were 40,000 members of the Women's Institute in Ontario and that our vision for "Home and Country" shall never perish. Her ideas was that we need better health measures, schools, laws, homes, and citizenship in our country and as Hon. Mr. Motherwell stated at luncheon at the Canadian National Exhibition this year, with the body of women we have in the W. I. there is nothing to prevent us having what we want. Mrs. Stone concluded her very appropriate reply by reciting a poem.

Now came a report of the standing committee on Education. All the W. I. work is on an educational basis. From the reports that had been sent in there was shown a keen interest in community work. This year being Jubilee Year, there seemed to be more time spent in schools on Canadian art, history, etc., than other years. It was the wish of the speaker that we stress more the reading of Canadian literature in our schools, also that we have more competition in music. In many branches they have been running a debating series which proves to be very educational. It was thought to be a fine plan for each branch to set a meeting during the year for the purpose of talking over and discussing educational topics. Mrs. Robertson, Provincial President of the W. I. desired that each branch would make one person a member of the League of Nations, get a bulletin and give a short sketch on what is being done in the League. The Women's Institutes have direct representation in the League of Nations. In time of peace we should study the peace program of the League and the points being discussed. Mrs. Robertson went on to say that she especially wished the rural women to study this bulletin and see what the League of Nations was trying to do and why the W. I. is given representation. In conclusion, Mrs. Robertson said she did wish us to link up both individually with the League and in the branch. We were now favored by a song by Mrs. Lucas. Report of the Standing Committee on Health by Dr. Margaret Patterson and Dr. Helen McMurchy. Dr. Margaret Patterson speaking first told of how she looked forward to speaking to the W. I. Convention with keen interest. She said that every person should at least once a year (preferably on their birthday), consult a doctor and have a physical examination. Dr. Patterson mentioned that it would be a fine idea if we had a Health Day in our schools, that if we consult a nurse or a doctor that they would be willing to assist. Dr. Patterson stressed that her slogan for the coming year is, "Make Maternity Safe." From reports that had been sent in the December did not think we were doing as good a job as we could for the child of the household. Dr. McMurchy's talk will come to any branch and give a talk on Nutrition, continued Dr. Patterson. Just here Dr. Patterson mentioned the forward work some branches were doing along the line of health. One branch held a clinic and the pupils of the school were inoculated for diphtheria. The W. I. should encourage the pupils to make health posters and give them some reward for the best one. This acts as an incentive and then there will be a better interest in the work. Another good idea was that, different women in a certain branch were preparing a well equipped medicine cabinet, containing medicines for emergency cases, etc. A good method for preparing this will be found in the Health Bulletin.

Dr. McMurchy, who was short, and a very humorous doctor, then spoke to us. She complimented Dr. Patterson for taking as her subject "The Mother." Her talk was based on making maternity safe. By means of slides it was shown in figures how safe maternity was. Dr. McMurchy explained the slides, showing the report of the medical inquiry into maternity morality.

Different branches that had been doing good work along the line of health were asked to tell how they carried it on. Pt. Credit branch, I remember, are doing especially good work along this branch of work. Mrs. Harris reported. They had a two-day Health Exhibit and planned the program accordingly. She stated that their motto was "Public Health and Morals." The doctors and ministers approved of the work they were doing and assisted them. They had an exhibit of Health and posters at their exhibit. Mrs. Harris stated that the Social Hygiene Council and the Provincial Department of Health were always ready to render assistance to any branch. They also had wax forms showing venereal diseases. They charged admission and I believe she said that over 400 visited this room of exhibits. Two evenings were given over to men and boys and two afternoons were given over to women and girls over 16. This was a wonderful piece of work as it showed.

REMARKABLE GROWTH OF BRITISH KNITWEAR CO.

Of all the industries in Simcoe it is probably no exaggeration to say that none has made more remarkable progress in the past two years than has the British Knitwear Co., located on Water Street. Two years ago last September four energetic young men, Messrs. Claude W. and Leo Pond, Merrel H. Hare and H. C. Springstead, with plenty of executive ability and practical knowledge of their business, but with limited capital, commenced operations in their present factory, with a staff of eight hands. Today they employ 52 hands within the factory, have 200 agents scattered from coast to coast, and three travelling salesmen. They also have a warehouse in Winnipeg to take care of their trade from that point to the coast. At the home factory they are making arrangements to double the capacity of their dye room, which will be completed during January.

In addition to this the British Knitwear Co. have leased the north store in the new Hambleton block on Norfolk Street, where the British Knitwear products are now displayed and sold, and the space before devoted to that purpose at the factory will be made available for further plant expansion. We were informed by Mr. Pond that the uptown store is somewhat in the nature of an experiment. In the event of its proving a success, and there is every reason to assume that it will, the Simcoe store will be the forerunner of a chain which this progressive firm intend establishing.
